PARISH COUNCIL UPDATES

- 2. Update from West Berkshire Council: On Saturday 16 and Sunday 17 March 2024 there will be a soil

- conditioner giveaway event at the Padworth Integrated Waste Management Facility (IWMF), Padworth Lane, RG7 4JF, between 10am and 4pm where residents will be able to pick up Veolia's locally produced soil conditioner for free! In addition, we will have recycling collection points for old or unwanted vapes, small electricals and batteries. For more information please see the West Berkshire Council website.
- 3. There is now a second vacancy on the Parish Council. You can read the <u>formal notice</u> on our website. - 4. Information from West Berkshire Council:

There is something called the Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF), which is a Government fund for small rural businesses.

Businesses can apply for between £10k - £40k to invest in a project that will help stimulate growth, diversification and employment in our rural communities.

The scheme is open for a year, and the Council will be allocating funding on a competitive, rollingprogramme basis, to the best applications every couple of months. To read more about the scheme and apply see:

COUNCILLOR CAROLYNE CULVER UPDATE

I'm writing this on 19th February. The biggest issue at the council now is the budget for 2024/25. The draft budget was discussed in detail at Scrutiny Commission in early February and will be debated and voted on at Full Council on 29th February. There was a good response to the public consultation and as a result the council has decided not to go ahead with cutting funds for bins and gully clearance. I think the flooding concentrated people's minds when it came to the latter proposal! There is still a longer-term debate to be had about the bins. There is some support among town and parish councils to take over the litter and dog bin contracts because of dissatisfaction with the company running the WBC litter bin contract. I made the point at Scrutiny Commission that if this happens it needs to be planned for so that town and parish

councils have time to factor it into their annual precept setting.

The council also decided not to close one of its three care homes, but it is still considering offloading them all to a private company. I have heard claims that the private sector can run them more efficiently, but the case against is that if the council has no care homes of our own in the future, we will have no choice but to pay whatever the private sector decides to charge. The budget for adult social care already far outstrips what the council spends on any other service. I often talk to councillors from other parts of the country and they have told me we should keep hold of our care homes because if we don't we will pay the price in the long term. This is the challenge for councils across the country – funds are tight so there is a pressure to cut spending now, even if that creates challenges for the future.

The council has started work on documenting the damage caused by the recent flooding and learning lessons for the future. It is still trying to identify at least 50 properties that were affected by internal flooding so that it can qualify for a government grant to distribute to those houses. The irony is that some people could really benefit from such funding, but other people don't declare that they were affected because they don't want it to increase their insurance premiums. If there wasn't the 50-property threshold set by the government, it wouldn't be a problem. More information here:

This doesn't necessarily come up in house surveys and residents can be happily oblivious to this issue until there is a problem with flooding and they find out that they should have been looking after the ditch.


MALTHOUSE WELL.

Well, the rain in February wasn't kind to us and we had over 90+mm rain in the month. This is about a third more than the long-term average for the month and it made its presence felt in the Malthouse well readings which didn't drop much at all during February. At the beginning of the month the Malthouse well level was

around 3.6 metres (approx. 11.8ft) below ground level and at the end of the month it had dropped by only about 100mm (approx. 4in) to around 3.70 metres (approx. 12.1ft) below ground level.

Thankfully, we haven't equalled (yet?) the high ground water level reached in 2014, and although the level has slightly dropped during the month it hasn't helped those in the village with cellars, which can still be seen periodically pumping out water. So far, our sewers and surface water drainage systems seem to be coping. However, the situation is much more serious in East Ilsley where, as we go to press, it is touch and go as to whether their sewerage system will be overwhelmed by ground water. If so, they will have a distinctly unpleasant situation with sewage flowing out of their sewers and into the streets.

Hopefully as we go into March the weather will get warmer and the vegetation will start growing which will remove water from the ground. This will help ameliorate the effect upon the groundwater level.



COUNTRY NOTES

March is the month of the hare. An animal of the chase, elevated by law to the status of game, a level above the vermin status of its cousin the rabbit. Over the centuries it has been coursed with gaze hounds, hunted by beagles, and shot. Fortunately hares are fecund, if the habitat is suitable, they will give birth to three or four litters per year, averaging three in a litter, so between nine and twelve leverets can be born to a single jill in one year. The death rate is high, foxes and cars the main predators. The brown hare is in decline in England, but these Berkshire Downs are an exception, Jacks and Jills thrive on these hills.

The hare figures large in folklore. Seventeen Devon churches have a motif of hares carved into their roof bosses. The motif depicts three hares running in a circle, they share three ears which form a triangle at its centre, there is a paradox here, although only three ears are depicted each hare has two. Ironically Devon is a county where the hare may now be extinct. Some think this motif represents the holy trinity, others that it originated in China and travelled west along the Silk Road, on its journey it appears in the religions of Buddhism, Paganism, Judaism, Christianity, and Islam.

Connecting Communities Berkshire (CCB) on Thursday 8th February. This informative, engaging and potentially lifesaving

training event was fully booked with many residents of West Ilsley in attendance as well some participants travelling from as far afield as Reading to attend. A range of scenarios were covered which included burns, bleeding heavily, choking, unresponsive and breathing, unresponsive and not

breathing and how to use a defibrillator. If you were unable to attend you may find it useful to download The British Red Cross app to keep handy on your phone. It gives clear and up to date advice on



how to deliver everyday first aid (some advice has changed since previous training attended by some people).

Connecting Communities Berkshire (CCB) and The British Red Cross may be able to deliver further training sessions, possibly in the Autumn if the demand is sufficient so look out for further training opportunities in the WIN.

On Friday, 9th February, it was wonderful to see West Ilsley Village Hall jam-packed, with standing



room only, as over 70 people were in attendance for Geoff Wond's captivating and fascinating talk about Owls-Fiction, Facts, Myths Legends. and There were many

interesting facts shared by Geoff such as that an owl's eyes weigh up to 5% of its total body weight; this may not sound like a lot but for comparison the

equivalent of this would be that a person weighing 80 kg would have eyes that weigh 2kg each! Geoff also discussed the five types of owls found in

Britain: The British Barn Owl, Tawny Owl, Short-eared Owl, Long-eared Owl, and the Little Owl and the sad fact that all five species are causing some degree of concern to conservationists. We are very lucky to have someone living



in our village who is so knowledgeable about these magnificent creatures as well as being passionate and proactive about their conservation and we are grateful to Geoff for the time he took to share his knowledge with us.

The bar was busy and it must be said that Matt's 'Owld Fashioned Cocktail' went down a 'tweet'! Half of the bar profits went to the Bucks, Berks and Oxon Wildlife Trust. Just a few words to add regarding the defibrillator in our village.

Following on from the British Red Cross First aid course recently held in the village hall we were informed about a link to 'The Defib Finder' a link to which you can find your nearest public Defibrillator should you ever need one or just familiarise yourselves with where local ones are:

One important thing to bear in mind (which was emphasised on the first aid course) in the event of an emergency YOU ARE ADVISED TO CALL 999 BEFORE DOING ANYTHING AND THEY WILL HAVE ACCESS TO THE CODE OF YOUR NEAREST DEFIBRILLATOR (so you don't need to memorise it).

Thank you to the Parish Council for paying for the maintenance of the defibrillator and to the Village Hall for providing the electricity, both ensuring that it is ready for use in an emergency.
