New Officers

This month I will start by mentioning a success for the sector. For some time now I have been campaigning to have new recruits based at Hungerford Police Station. Unfortunately it hasn't happened for the past few years with one of the arguments being that, due to the nature of the work encountered in this rural area, it is not suitable for the broad band of on-the-job training that is required. I have put up counter arguments to this theory and supported by the new Inspector, Derek Lake, I am pleased to announce this policy is about to change and our first new boy arrives in November. Treat him gently!!

<u>CCTV</u>

I suppose BRAZIL! might be a dirty word for some people but football aside, a recent delegation of interested parties from the South American Mecca of football, arrived in Reading to view and be trained on the highly successful CCTV system which operates in the town centre. I mention this because we use a very similar set up in both Hungerford and Newbury which over the years has helped resolve numerous crimes and the Reading system was almost the entire prosecution case recently, when a conviction for murder was gained by the evidence provided by the system. Sometimes it pays to have Big Brother watching over you!!

<u>RESULŤS</u>

It is always satisfying to get a 'good result' and such a thing happened a couple of weeks ago when yours truly was the area supervisory cover for the late shift period when we had a nasty robbery occur on the tow path at Newbury. The aggrieved was 22 weeks pregnant and she was dragged to the ground and injured whilst 5 youths stole her handbag and its contents. Fortunately after a concerted effort by the uniformed officers on duty, the traffic department, a police dog (and his handler) and CID officers all five offenders were tracked down by various means and arrested, some of which ended up being charged and remanded in the custody of Her Majesty!! The injured lady suffered cuts and bruises but fortunately was not as seriously injured as was first thought to be the case.

It was a busy night for me because as I was driving back to Hungerford to put my police car to bed for the night I was despatched to a burglary, actually in progress, in Charnham Park where four males described as of Asian Appearance were using sledge hammers to smash their way into a computer premises in an attempt to steal. Fortunately for the company in question, a brave member of the public interrupted the offenders' progress and they fled empty handed. Unfortunately they escaped without being apprehended but, hopefully, a forensic examination of the crime scene might give us some leads.

OTHER SUCCESS

I mentioned burglaries in my last report and 'creep in' type burglaries in the North of our patch have been a particular problem. I am pleased to announce that a team of Kosovan refugees was arrested after an extensive search involving police dogs, after the team was disturbed committing a house burglary in Hungerford. Property from another such burglary was found in their car and after house searches at their addresses in Oxford more stolen property was recovered from other burglaries in the Hungerford sector and other persons were arrested. An excellent job that involved a lot of man-hours in the follow up investigation.

I have also mentioned car crime in these columns and have referred to the problems we experience in the motorway service areas. We had one super result at Chieveley services last week where a well-known car thief from the Slough area was arrested IN a stolen car breaking into another car. We also mounted a mini plain-clothed operation at the same services where another male was arrested for drugs offences.

I've run out of time and publishing space this month so will continue with the individual Parish theme next month. Hopefully you have found the change of tack this month interesting.

VILLAGE HALL PONTOON

The English League football season will be starting again soon and we hope to run the "football pontoon", based on News of the World rules, as in previous years. This brings in an annual income of about £250 which is a help towards the upkeep of your hall. The league consists of approx. 130 teams so we need that many players, if possible. Each pontoon, every player has a team picked "out of the hat" and the aim is for your team to be the first to score eleven goals. This will usually take 3 or 4 weeks and the winner(s) is paid according to the number of weeks (£7.00 per week). A booby prize of £2.00 per week is paid to the team with the lowest score. Everyone is then picked a new team for the next pontoon. There are normally 10 pontoons and it costs just 50p per pontoon i.e. £5.00 per person for the whole season. POSTAL SERVICES Peter Bartaby

Like myself I imagine that most W.I. Residents have received the advice from Consignia (Royal Mail's deceased name) that in future, unless you pay £750 per year you will only receive one postal delivery per day – which will be at any time up to Noon.

Quite apart from the annoyance/inconvenience which this will cause, my other thoughts were that, as our collections are currently done by the two daily Delivery 'Posties' (John and Bob) if only one of them is to be serving the Village the likelihood is that there will only be ONE collection per day, possibly around Midday when the delivery has finished – which will hardly be convenient or, much of a *service*.

Likewise, with only one delivery the Post Bus would look to be a thing of the past for there is hardly any point in someone going in to Newbury on the Morning vehicle (when the delivery is finished) if there is not going to be any Afternoon vehicle available to bring them back – and regrettably, if things don't improve in regard to usage of Newbury Bus Route No. 6 it now seems that after September the Post Bus will be our only Bus contact with Newbury (but it won't bring you home if things are as they seem in the original 'Delivery Charges' letter.

So I wrote to Consignia's 'Delivery Specification Director!!' not only to object to the revised delivery service(!) being IMPOSED upon us but also to ask whether they had considered the questions of Collections and Post Buses.

I didn't receive a letter in reply but 'lan' phoned on the Director's behalf yesterday and in a 25 minute conversation I became more and more convinced that I was talking to someone trained by Alistair Campbell Teacher for he showed no appreciation whatsoever of the problems which their proposals might cause. He was only concerned that Consignia had lost money on it's Postal Service (largely – as most people would, I think, say through it's blatant inefficiency, overmanning and extravagance) and it was quite evident that 'lan' believes the Public must pay up/suffer to keep Consignia in the style to which it has become accustomed. I pressed the point about Collection frequency and Post Buses and was assured (!) by 'lan' that these would be unaffected by the new routine – which assurance I was as hesitant to accept from him as his " it will be better in the long run".

So if you post letters or use the Post Bus. . . .KEEP HOPING
