# PARISH COUNCIL Linda Gibson Clerk - Tel 200242

The next Meeting of West IIsley Parish Council will be held on Thursday May 15<sup>th</sup> 2003 at 7.00p.m. in The Village Hall. This will be closely followed by The Annual Parish Assembly at approximately 8.00p.m. Please note this is a <u>change of date</u> from that published in last months W.I.News.

The guest speaker this year will be Abby Thomas from The Community Council for Berkshire and the subject will be 'A Parish Plan for West IIsley'.

As always, all residents of West Isley are welcome to attend these meetings, and hopefully there will be a good turnout on the evening.

Extracts from the minutes of West Ilsley Parish Council <u>Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> March, 2003 at 7.00p.m.</u> (please see notice boards for a full copy).

<u>Flooding.</u> Nick Carter reported that W.B.D.C. Highways Department had informed him that necessary works to the drainage system did not appear on the schedule for 2003/2004 but should appear on the program of works within the next three years. Several villagers expressed concern that the necessary works are constantly being postponed due to a lack of funding. Nick Carter promised to again talk to the Highways Department. <u>Gritting of Bury Lane</u>. Following discussions with the Highways Department, Nick Carter reported that Bury Lane did not meet the criteria to become a primary gritting route. Nick Carter to bring a copy of the criteria for gritting to the next meeting.

<u>West IIsley Tennis Club</u>. The Chairman of the Tennis Management Committee, John Clemenger had written detailing essential work that was required to the surface and surrounding fencing. The total cost of the work being £2090.00 plus v.a.t. The Committee appealed to the Parish Council for a donation of £350 to make up the shortfall in their funds. After some discussion, Nick Carter proposed support for the Tennis Club appeal, Andy Day seconded. David Holling abstained. Motion carried. It was then agreed that a procedure should be put in place to be followed in future by any organisations applying for grants. Andy Day to create a draft.

<u>Bury Lane Sign</u>. Further to requests from villagers to have the sign at the end of Bury Lane reinstated, W.B.D.C. now have the matter in hand.

Formal Naming of 'Main Street'

Following consultation with the Emergency Services and the Royal Mail, all residents of the road known as Main Street have been consulted regarding the formal naming of the road. The clerk received one letter of objection and one letter of support. It was unanimously agreed that the procedure to formally name the street should be put in place. Clerk to write to Teresa Cambell at W.B.D.C. Highways asking her to proceed. <u>W.I. Recreation Ground</u> – Proposal from W.I. Cricket club to create an Artificial Surface.

The Chairman of the Cricket Club, Richard Beech, outlined the above proposal and asked the Parish Council if there would be any objection from the Parish Council to the proposal as approximately 1.5metres of the practice area will fall on land leased by the Parish Council from Lockinge Estate. He explained that separate arrangements were being made to seek permission from Lockinge Estate. He also stated that the surface would be open for village use at no charge. The Parish Council unanimously agreed that permission be given.

# A WEST ILSLEY PARISH PLAN?

Local people know their community best and have a vested interest in shaping its future. Parish Plans present an excellent opportunity for local people to come together, explore the local issues and sign up to a shared vision for the parish. They can then develop an action plan which will map out a route for how they can get there.

A Parish Plan is also a powerful statement of local people's views and, as such, will be a tool for ensuring that service planners use locally identified needs and ideas as a starting point when making decisions. For example, influencing Supplementary Planning Guidance (working with the Local Authority) or influencing community services and facilities (such as childcare, neighbourhood watch etc).

There are some grants available through the Countryside Agency to assist in this process –  $\pounds$ 5000 for undertaking the parish plan and then other grants for funding community based projects which are in the action plan.

Community based projects will mean a better quality of life for local people with the added benefit of more community spirit through local people being involved.

BALLROOM BLITZ

On Sunday 13th April, about half the members of the West Ilsley Ballroom Dancing (Close-Formation) Team took the opportunity to meet Pat, our instructor, at the Southern England Ballroom Dancing Championships in Reading. The visit was intended to illustrate the heady heights to which we aspire in our regular Wednesday evening Ballroom Dance classes in the Village Hall.

Well - what can I say?! We arrived to find that the Children's Competition had recently finished and the prize-giving had commenced. Over the next twenty minutes, a selection of well-behaved, well-mannered and beautifully-presented children waltzed, tangoed, spun and pirouetted their way up the Trophy table and collected Silverware that would not have looked out of place in the trophy room at Manchester United; some of the dancers were smaller than the Cups but clearly all were quite astonishingly adept with their feet! Prizes were awarded right down to sixth place - an echo of the adult tournament - and clearly they all enjoyed it, even when they had to kiss each other in congratulation!

## EVEREST EXPEDITION

The following article by Toby Garland was provided by Janice Sheperd – Toby is their son-in-law. The article was written for NZ Ski and Snowboard magazines. They leave for Tibet on 5<sup>th</sup> May.

March 23<sup>rd</sup> 2003. Ever since I first came to the Chamonix Valley at the age of 21, the lifestyle and energy of the people here excited me. People from as far afield as New Zealand and Australia, to Hawaii, the USA and Scandinavia all shared a common reason for packing their bags each winter and heading to Chamonix to live in the semi-squalour of a dog box sized apartment with little more sleeping space than one bed and a couple of lumpy sofas. The reason for this.... the blurry and bloodshot eyes met every morning as the curtains were drawn and the sun struck the splendour of the surrounding mountains and the adventures to be had within. This is where the story of the North Col Snow Riders begins....

For five years I lived this lifestyle interspersed with time back in the so called real world to earn enough money so I could return to buy a season pass and pay a quarter share of the exorbitant dog box rent in order to spend another 100 days or thereabouts sliding about up in the mountains. These foundation seasons also introduced me to some wonderfully humble, yet legendary mountain guides, skiers and snowboarders alike who are nothing short of the modern heros in the realm of mountain sports. I have had the pleasure and honour of following some of these people to places in the mountains that otherwise I would not have dreamed existed. Steep glaciers with powder snow that most folk would only see pictures of in magazines and movies. Scenery as striking and emotive as perhaps of that in a fantasy... and alongside all of this, endless hours of fun both alone and with friends, riding the snow with screaming legs and inane grins beaming from somewhere between absolute agony and sheer pleasure.

Now, another six years on having found a career niche to fill, I sit here in the Chamonix Valley, with my wife Louise watching my two year old son Alistair and eight month old daughter Phoebe play contentedly in this place that we have made our home. About to embark on a journey and an adventure with a small group of friends, the North Col Snow Riders, who will no doubt over the next two months become more like brothers and sisters. Jonny Hughes, a carpenter and surfer from New Zealand who out of the blue, arrived on our doorstep three years ago just when we desperately needed help with the initial stages of renovating the almost derilict chalet that we had invested our every cent in. Zoe Smalley, a young English girl who moved to Chamonix as a sixteen year old and who we will no doubt be seeing lots more of over the next few years as her competitive career as a freeride snowboarder develops. Abi Pickett, another young English girl with an endless amount of energy and is devotedly training to become a ski instructor. Antony Beckett, godfather to my daughter and one of my oldest friends here with who I shared a couple of winter seasons in the dogbox years, and Glenn Blackwood, an Aussi mate of many seasons, godfather to my son and a man who represents the eternal ski bum spirit of Chamonix. These are my friends and this is an expedition concept that has been quietly evolving in my head for a few years now, and in more recent months, become an all consuming ambition.

Fifty years after Sir Edmund Hillary and Sherpa Tenzing returned safely from climbing Mt Everest for the first time in history, we are heading off to the forbidden lands of Tibet to undertake the most mentally and physically challenging ski and snowboard descent that any of us will have ever encountered. The plan is to trek to, climb, then descend from the North Col, a wind-scoured shoulder at 7030m on the most famous mountain in the world, Mt Everest. Why?.... because I believe two things... one, that it is within the reach of any person who aspires to one day realize a goal that outwardly appears to border the impossible and secondly that unified adventure is a healthy experience to be had in this modern world of division.

The Stones and the Beatles, the rough and the smooth, the whiskey and the wine. All very clichéd polarities and all reflected in the all to often wrongly perceived conservative and old school nature of skiing and the wildly outrageous image of grunge and rebellion that is snowboarding. Two sports with their own sub cultures that have traditionally been dictated and hewn by the forces of fashion and cool, skiing and snowboarding are closer than they have ever been before, and with this in mind the North Col Snow Riders will soon be getting on a plane to the Himalayas after many weeks preparation and training to lay down the first ever combined sets of ski and snowboard tracks on the highest mountain in the world.

Ahead lies unknown trepidation for each of us as we will undoubtedly confront our own personal limits of physical and mental endurance. An environment not yet encountered by any of us, interminably waits at 7000 meters above sea level and our performance as a unified team on this journey will encounter testing The stability in our undertaking is the times. integration of friendships and the articulated passion for snow riding. The monumental journey ahead and untold adventures to be had in Kathmandu, through the forgotten city of Lhasa, across the Tibetan plateau and ultimately onto to Mt Everest, lie just around the corner. The excitement is building and the team are psyched. The training is going well and only time will reveal how the story progresses from here .....
