'ELLO ELLO ELLO' Sergeant Rob Athawes Community Policing Team, Hungerford

GENERAL INTEREST

Firstly I would like to take this opportunity to apologise for not submitting an article last month. The main reason for this was time, or lack of it!! I am currently working as a single Sergeant as my colleague PS Banfield has been away for the best part of a month. Consequently I have had twice the workload and I have been away myself for a couple of weeks, on Holiday in France with my family, which was really nice but of course there is all the catching up to do when you return!!

PARKING

I mention this subject this month as we receive a great deal of correspondence on the matter and it is another area where people get frustrated. I suppose I am using these pages as a plea to all you motorists out there to think both before and after you have parked. THINK when you park partially on the pavement. Would a mother (or father) be able to push a babe in a pushchair through the gap you have left! OR have you parked outside someone's driveway to the extent that they will not be able to get in or out with their car! Both scenarios are classed as parking illegally and fall within obstruction laws!

RESULTS

Firstly I would like to mention that a young man who has been a real pain in the sides of residents in and around the Chieveley area and surrounding villages was arrested a couple of weeks ago after good police work led to him being located hiding under some clothing in a loft in a house in Beedon. He had been on the 'run' from the police for two or three weeks so it was good to get him into our custody. At the time of writing he has been charged with two burglaries an assault and an arson with more offences to follow I understand. He is currently residing at Her Majesty's

pleasure and is likely to be there for two or three months!

Over the last 2 weeks these are just some of the crimes and arrests of note.

A female from Kintbury was arrested for theft, charged and bailed.

Yours truly had to arrest an adult female after a violent domestic incident in East Garston where extensive damage was caused inside a house.

An adult male and an adult female who were staying at an address in Chieveley were both arrested for Burglary, theft and aggravated vehicle taking. Both were charged, and the male was remanded in prison custody.

An adult male from Lambourn was arrested and charged with drink driving.

After an accident in Hungerford High Street an adult female was arrested for failing to provide a breath specimen. She was later charged.

An adult male from Inkpen was arrested for assault but later released without charge.

An adult male from Inkpen was arrested and charged with ecstasy possession.

An adult male who hails from the Faringdon area was arrested in Hungerford for drink driving but was later found to be just under the drink drive limit.

PC Becky Brown here at Hungerford has been dealing with 3 individuals from the Marlborough area who caused damage to several vehicles and other property after a fracas in the High Street. These men have returned on bail and one of them was charged with 3 lots of criminal damage and the offence of drunk and disorderly conduct. No charges were brought against the others

An adult male from East IIsley was arrested and charged with assaulting his estranged wife.

A youth offender from Chieveley has been arrested and charged with theft.

An adult male from Hungerford was arrested for drink driving but later released without charge.

An adult female who is currently residing in Newbury but hails from Hungerford has been arrested and charged with theft by shoplifting.

I happened to be in Newbury a few days ago when I was in the right place at the right time, when I arrested two well known adult males, who are both addicted to drugs, for theft from a shop after they had made off along the canal tow path after running away from staff.

FOSTERING ENTERS THE 21ST CENTURY

A new, independent fostering agency is bringing fostering in Berkshire into the 21st Century. The new agency's foster carers all get paid a proper fee for caring for the child rather than just an allowance to cover basic costs and the agency operates an around the clock, 24 hours service, so support is always at hand. Agency director, Andy Clipson, says "in this day and age, it make no sense at all to expect foster carers to subsidise the cost of caring for a child or have to cope alone outside of office hours- although loving care is essential, there are times when love is simply not enough".

The new agency, aptly known as familyplacement.com, has been developed to find foster parents for the growing number of Berkshire children who desperately need a home. The new agency works in close collaboration with local authority services and is currently seeking short and long term foster homes for a number of local children.
