TENNIS

The Tennis Court at the moment is closed for essential repairs. We are repairing broken wires and damaged fencing; treating the playing surface with a specialist moss killer and the surrounding verges with another general purpose weed killer. The supporting fence posts require wire brushing and painting and a broken paving slab along the pathway needs repair. We are renewing the central net strap and attachments and also the brass handle that operates the net pulley wheel. The bench also will be repainted and the notice board renovated.

Likewise, we thank the Tennis Booking Clerk, Elaine Clemenger, for her work in 1997 and her honorarium of £25 has been paid.
