'ELLO ELLO ELLO' Sergeant Rob Athawes Community Policing Team, Hungerford

General Interest

For some time now, I have been writing regular articles in one or two of the Parish Magazines that exist on the Geographical Area that we police from Hungerford, known as the Hungerford and Downlands policing sector. I would like to think that, from the feed back that I have received, it has been a fairly popular venture, where I have tried to put across to you, reading public, what we, the police, have been getting up to on any given month. I have included in the articles such things as items that should be of a general interest to most of you, recent arrests and associated stories, and recent trends of crime on the area and things that we would like YOU to keep your eyes peeled for.

I have been asked, by the powers that be, to expand my audience via other Parish magazines and, in so doing, meeting some of our goals in the form of public consultation. It DOES appear to work judging by the additional information and contacts that we have built up over that same period of time. I always try to encourage people to speak to us if you feel you need our help. We will not always be able to give you that help direct, dependent upon what is asked of us, but we will certainly point you in the right direction if we can. SO HERE GOES!!

Community Policing Team

From Hungerford we run what we term as a Community Policing Team and we try hard to achieve exactly what you would image the title to mean, a team of police officers who try to meet community needs, for the sector in which we work. With the compliment of officers we have at our disposal, we cannot always meet those demands, so we have to heavily prioritise our workloads, but I can promise you, the Hungerford team will always do it's best.

The Team

Our current team consists of the following officers. We work in pairs or PARTNERS and this reflects how we try to work overall, in Partnership, both in terms of police circles and with the many outside agencies (e.g. social services, housing associations, Youth Offending Teams etc.....)

Introductions

Inspector Andrew Talbot is the BOSS!

Myself and Sergeant Pam Banfield are in charge of team supervision but Pam has overall responsibility for crime, operations and investigation and I have overall responsibility for most Community related issues, hence the reason why I'm writing this article. It will usually be me that you deal with direct.

PCs Andrew Casey and Mike Vaughan are responsible for the Parishes of Chieveley, Hermitage, East and West Illsley, Beedon, Peasemore and Winterbourne.

PCs Steve Lynch and Gerry Wooldridge are responsible for Lambourn, East Garston, Great Shefford, Fawley, Brightwalton, Chaddleworth, Leckhampstead and Catmore

PCs Becky Brown and Roy Barrington are responsible for the Hungerford Parish and PC's Andrew Buckingham and Blowfield are responsible for the Parishes of Kintbury, Inkpen, Welford, Combe, West Woodhay, Enbourne, Hampstead Marshall, Wickham, Welford and Boxford.

The important thing to remember though is that we are a Team, so it could be any one of the above officers who attends to deal with YOUR reported incident.

At present we usually cover between the hours of 8am until midnight Sunday to Friday and from 8am until 2am on Friday and Saturday nights. Outside of these hours police response comes from Newbury police station via the police control room.

To contact the team

In an EMERGENCY (ONLY) DIAL 999.

During office hours if you need to contact the team phone 01488 685915 where, dependent on the time of day, you will either be able to talk to Carol, our Civilian Duty Officer, one of the officers direct, or leave a message on the answerphone. Alternatively the phones will occasionally be transferred to Newbury where you will also be able to leave a message.

If the matter needs police <u>attendance</u> but it's NOT an emergency contact the police control room on 01635 31000.

I will expand into other matters as time moves on. In particular I feel it is important that you are aware of what we are involved in, what type of crime is occurring in your areas and any matters that we feel that you should be aware of .e.g. a spate of shed burglaries in your village. TALKING OF WHICH. We have just started to have a few 'breaks' of this type throughout the whole sector which always tends to happen at this time of year so my 'tip for the month' would be to increase your garden shed/store security, if at all possible, security mark all precious items, particularly mowers, chain saws and hedge trimmers and make sure you separately record serial numbers!! to give us a chance if you were to have them stolen.

MR GREENFINGERS' ADVICE FOR BEGINNERS

February/March

Sweet Peas

Now is an ideal time to plant sweet peas either indoors, or if the weather is warm enough, directly into the soil.

I prefer to plant sweet peas into special sweet pea tubes which allow the roots to develop without restriction, although toilet roll tubes work just as well. Plant the seeds about half an inch deep. Do not use seed trays or small pots as the roots do not like to be disturbed.

Place in a cool area indoors, perhaps on a window sill, and within a week or so you should see signs of germination. Keep moist and when the shoots are about 8" tall nip out the growing tip to encourage bushiness.

Plant out the tubes, without removing the plants, to minimise root disturbance, in late spring. Canes or netting will be needed to support the peas which will grow to a height of up to 6 feet or more.

Geraniums (Pelargoniums)

If you really want a challenge, plant 2-3 seeds into small pots and cover with about 1/6 of an inch of compost. Water gently with a fine rose or mist spray and cover with a plastic bag and seal with a rubber band. A steady temperature of 70-75 degrees is required. The seedlings should emerge in about 21 days.

A better alternative is to go to a Garden Centre and buy a pack of plant plugs. These have been germinated and are sturdy little plants. Gently transplant into 3" plant pots, keep warm and moist. After about 4-5 weeks repot into 5" pots. Continue to water and feed with a high potash fertiliser such as Phostrogen. Cut off dead flower heads to encourage repeat flowering.

Look out for vegetable advice next month.

MARATHON STRUGGLE

Our one-year-old daughter, Anna, would never have been born without the skill and dedication of an amazing team of doctors and nurses at the John Radcliffe Hospital's Silver Star Unit. Carmel had been through nine miscarriages and would have given up trying for another baby had it not been for Professor Chris Redman, who founded the unit to help women facing an exceptionally difficult struggle to have a

child. The professor encouraged her to have another go and met her almost every week to check that the course of drugs, hormones and rest that he'd prescribed was doing the trick. It was, and although Carmel had to go into hospital a couple of times, she was able to keep the pregnancy going almost to full term. When we held Anna for the first time, we could hardly believe it.

On April 14, I'll be running the London Marathon with the professor to raise money for the Silver Star Society, a registered charity that supports the work of the unit. The Silver Star helps more than 400 women a year like Carmel to have a baby against all odds. We're now trying to raise £100,000 so that the unit can expand and help even more. Would you be prepared to sponsor me? The last 10 miles of the marathon are hell (especially when your nipples start bleeding!) so I'd be grateful for any encouragement and my employer, The Sunday Times, will double any donation you may care to make.
