Public talk in Oxford, 26 June 2006

WIN WALKS walking in the

neighbourhood Fred Carter

A circular walk starting from Leckhampstead 4½ miles. Map O/S Explorer 158
Start the walk from the War Memorial in Leckhampstead Street.

The war memorial on the green is particular interest and consists of obelisk with a clock. Around the

memorial are staddle stones surmounted by shell cases linked by a chain. The chain came from a battleship which fought at the Battle of Jutland during WW1. The clocks hands are bayonets, the roman numerals are rifle bullets and the minutes are marked by machine gun bullets.

Start the walk by heading away from The Stag public house and take the road around to the left towards Chaddleworth almost immediately you will find a track on the right running along the right hand side of some houses....Follow this track for about ¾ of a mile and stay on it as it bears sharply right and continues for 200 yards to join the Wantage Road.

...Turn right, then after about 20 yards, opposite the electricity sub station, turn left, Take great care crossing the road and take the path opposite up the bank. Keep the hedge to your left and follow the path as it climbs and then curves to the left.

Ignore the gap on the left and continue straight ahead keeping the hedge on your left. At the top left hand corner of the field join a narrow woodland path that leads to a minor road. Turn right here and follow the road to a T junction at the edge of Peasemore by The Fox and Hounds public house....Turn left and almost immediately right along a clearly defined path, stay on this path until it joins a minor road, to your left you will find St Barnabas Church......Turn right here along the road until you reach a road junction at a triangle of green, turn right and stay on the road until a T junction. Here go ahead across the grass to join a clearly defined track which leads you back to the Wantage Road at Egypt. Turn left towards Newbury for about 200 yards. Turn right, cross the road very carefully and take a grassy path that leads you back to the War memorial.

MAIOR CHANGES TO VEHICLE USE ON THE RIDGEWAY NATIONAL TRAIL

A considerable length of The Ridgeway National Trail previously used by recreational vehicles will be free of such traffic in the future.

Over 22 miles of The Ridgeway through Oxfordshire and West Berkshire have become 'restricted byways', a new category of public right of way introduced under the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000. Restricted byways can be used by walkers, cyclists, horseriders and drivers of horse-drawn carriages, but not by recreational vehicles such as motorcycles and 4 by 4s. The Act applies to the whole country and

any public right of way that was previously termed a 'road used as a public path' is now a restricted byway.

Nearly 18 miles of The Ridgeway west of the River Thames is now a restricted byway from south of the village of Bishopstone (southeast of Swindon) all the way east to above the village of Compton, west of Goring- on-Thames. East of the Thames, over 4½ miles from Britwell Hill near Watlington to the A40 is also now a restricted byway.

"Our National Trails team will be changing the signage on The Ridgeway this summer to make sure everyone is clear about these new sections of restricted byway", said Margaret Caddick, National Trails Officer. "Information will also be updated to include advice on restricted byways for all users of the Trail, to inform them of where they can legally go and to whom they should report any problems."

Although it may take some time for everyone to become aware of this change, in time recreational vehicle use of The Ridgeway will become much reduced. They will still be able to use byway sections of the National Trail in Wiltshire and West Berkshire mostly from April to October only, and a very short section in Buckinghamshire, but this constitutes just 17 miles of the 87 miles of The Ridgeway.

Village CAMP OUT & BBQ

The Village Hall Committee are pleased to announce that the annual Village Camp Out will take place on Saturday June 17th (from 2pm) and extend through to Sunday 18th (10am).

It will be centred around camping, with an afternoon activity around the camp and in the woods followed by a camp sleep over.

The aim of the Camp Out is to invite all West Ilsley villagers and ex villagers to enjoy a camp out together and for all ages to mix and socialise.

Details as follows:

Part 1 - Saturday afternoon 2-5pm

Activites for all ages of children who can be left (under 3's accompanied please), led by volunteers from the village.

under 5yr olds – mini treasure hunt and games 5-8yr olds – camp skills + adventure trek 8yr plus – tracking and adventure trek (min 2hr walk) To conclude the afternoon, hot dog tea and marshmallows for all cooked on the fire.

Part 2 - Saturday 5pm to Sunday 10am

From 5-6pm the camp is prepared for the night and for those children staying a responsible adult should arrive. Tents are put up and we strongly recommend that this is done as a family activity after 5pm. We then play games and enjoy a family BBQ supper in the evening (from 7pm).

Cook breakfast, take down camp, clean and tidy up. Finish 10am Sunday.

Open to all West Ilsley children of any age.

Part 1, all children over 3 can be left, but helpers welcome and needed.

Part 2, a responsible parent/adult/volunteer to accompany (on a ratio of no more than 1 adult to 4 kids), help out and sleep over from 5pm to 10am.

The camp site is located 1 mile outside West Ilsley. Take the Catmore road and follow the signs. Park inside the gate on the LHS.

All food and drink is included for Part 1. For Part 2 please bring your own supper. We shall have a BBQ fire going so we suggest you bring something to cook and your own refreshments. Juice and water will be available throughout plus tea/coffee, sugar, milk, cereal, bacon, bread and jam for the morning. Please bring anything else you wish to eat or drink. Adults bring your own – cork screw and barrel of bitter supplied!

There will be a charge this year (£10 per tent), and we do require your signed booking form in advance. Without this we cannot accept the child/ren. The weekend will go ahead whatever the weather!!

To join in, wear appropriate old clothing that you don't mind getting dirty or torn. For Part 2, the following kit is required.

- Tent for you and your child/ren. Do try to acquire one or buy a cheap one (Millets/Argos £40)
- Thick sleeping bag/duvet and Sleeping mat (optional)
- Waterproof top and trousers
- Thick wool jumper or fibrepile
- Spare warm trousers, socks and long sleeved shirt
- Warm hat/gloves and good shoes or boots
- o **Torch**
- Plastic mug, plate & bowl plus cutlery for you.
