COUNTRY NOTES

The resident birds are quiet, except for the robin who has persisted with its warbling subsong throughout the winter, cheering us during the shortest days. Beyond the garden it is the winter visitors that are prominent. Fieldfare and redwing haunt the hedgerows, a small flock of golden plover wheel across the sky between Abbot's Heath and Sheep Down, short-eared owls sleep away the short daylight hours in the long rough grass between the racehorse gallops, awaiting the return of the half-light to resume their hunt for voles.

Ruddy topped stubble turnips bulge from the earth, the skin of their bellies a pallid white that have never seen the sun, now pushed into the light by rain swelled roots. I cut a slice; it tastes of rain with a hint of white pepper. Along the dark edge of The Heath a pale shape, wraith like in the predawn light, binoculars reveal a white fallow doe, she senses my presence and without appearing to move, melts into the wood and is gone.

A barn owl, tinged orange by the light from the newly risen sun, flies low over the rough grass alongside Park Wood, a silent buoyant flight, a brief hover, an unrewarded swoop and then, passing low over my head, crosses the road to continue its hunt. From just inside the wood a willow tit scolds, tzi tzi tzi tzi. Along Old Street a small party of long tailed tits bobble through the thorns, continually calling to each other as they go, like so many small children anxious not to become separated, "wait for me, come this way".

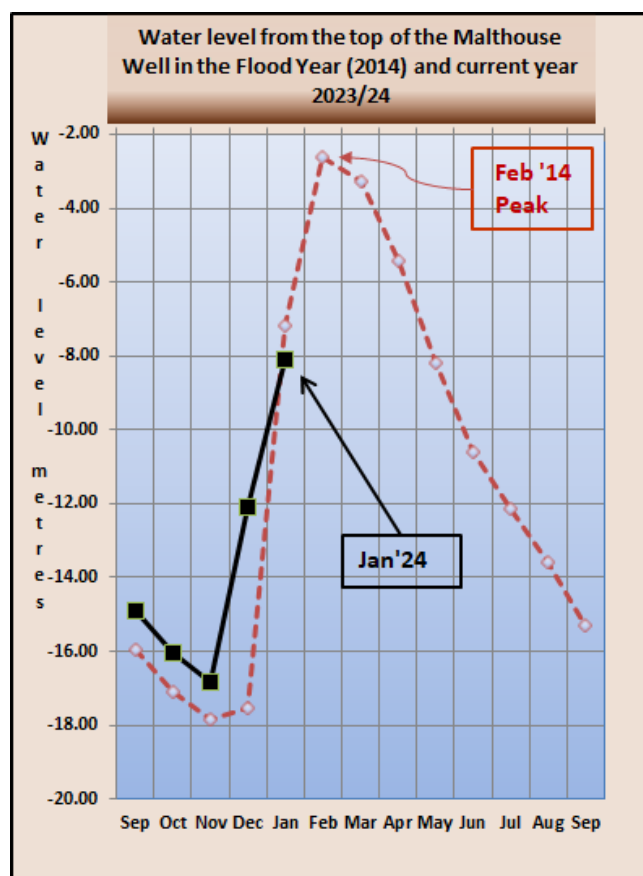
MALTHOUSE WELL

Drama occurred at the Malthouse well in December when the measuring gauge appeared to be giving false readings and was stuck at around 12 metres (approx. 39.4ft). Experts had to be called in mid-December to recalibrate the entire gauge mechanism. As a result the well reading appears to suddenly jump to about 8 metres (approx. 26.3 ft) below ground level. Following the very wet Autumn we've had this is quite a

significant rise, and gives us less headroom when considering the 5.5 metre (approx. 18.1ft) critical level when some cellars may start to get wet.

Thankfully the rainfall in December has been around its average range of about 70mm (approx. 3in) and this has helped to slow the ground water rise somewhat. We also need the January weather to be kind to us rain-wise and the Met Office long term forecast for January is currently not indicating that we should expect a mega amount of rain in January. For those amongst us who were here in January 2014 they may remember that we had well over double the average rainfall in that month and this boosted the ground water level to give rise to the flood conditions.

The graph below shows the difference between now and when we had the floods in 2014. The groundwater level is currently about 1 metre (3.1ft approx) lower now than back in January 2014 and provided the rain gods are kind to us hopefully we will be OK.

On 14th of December, we had Parent Welcome where parents looked at our school books. Parents of all classes came in for ten minutes after school to examine their child's books. It was great for the parents to see their children's books.

On the 15th of December, it was Christmas Carousel Day where we enjoy lots of Christmas activities. We went around the classrooms in our school houses enjoy cooking, arts and crafts. It was a great day to bond with the new receptions and have a day of Christmas fun.
