## POLICE UPDATE

Police crackdown on vehicle crime – West Berkshire 08/01/07

Police in West Berkshire are sending a warning to thieves with a crackdown on vehicle crime.

Operation Friday, which brought together resources from across the

area in a concerted effort to catch the criminals, was carried out over the festive season.

Using data from analysts, a trap car was placed in vehicle crime 'hotspots', at times when such crimes are most likely to occur.

Supt Chris Shead, LPA Commander for West Berkshire, said: "Figures have shown that thefts of and from vehicles have increased by 7per cent, as well an increase in damage to vehicles. This is obviously something that we want to address.

"We are targeting our resources at these hotspots in an intelligence-led operation, with the aim of disrupting criminal activity and catching offenders. "We will be carrying out further operations in the coming months, so I warn thieves that we take vehicle crime very seriously and those caught could face a prison term."

This crackdown ties in with the 'virtually stolen' and Crimestoppers campaigns, which are aimed at making people aware of the dangers of leaving valuables in their cars.

Romy Freiburghaus, Crime Reduction Adviser for West Berkshire, said: "It is very common for people to get out of their car and forget to secure valuable items such as sat navs and mobile phones.

"The aim of the Virtually Stolen campaign is to make people aware that they have left something valuable in their car and give them advice about how to make their car more secure, so that next time they think twice about leaving valuables in their car."

Mike Smith, from Crimestoppers, said: "In order to stop vehicles being broken into and the contents stolen we need to know who is committing the crime.

The Crimestoppers campaign is to encourage people to give specific details which will then be passed to the police for action. The main message is 'Car thieves want our valuables, don't make it easy for them'. It's easy to tell us who they are, just call 0800 555 111, you will not be asked your name and you need never speak to the police but your information is vital.

# **Push for more PCSOs across West Berkshire**

West Berkshire LPA has been leading the way with its support for a Home Office campaign to attract more Police Community Support Officers.

The LPA has been backing the Home Office recruitment for 500 more PCSOs in the Thames Valley with a number of high-profile initiatives during the past few months to raise awareness of the role in the media.

BCU Commander Ch Supt Richard Bennett went out on patrol with PCSO Ray Breach in Newbury Town Centre to give the campaign a high profile start and they were featured in the Newbury Weekly News cycling around town together.

Since then PCSO Lisa Marks, from Thatcham, and PCSO Marie Maloney, from Pangbourne, have provided detailed accounts of the roles they perform which have also received widespread press coverage.

Ch Supt Bennett said: "We have been delighted to back this recruitment campaign with a number of initiatives

"The PCSOs that we already have in this area have made a real difference to the communities that they serve.

"They have established community links and have made a real contribution to resolving issues like anti-social behaviour which people wanted sorted out.

"It is vital that we attract more people to the job to enable us to roll-out Neighbourhood Policing."

The recruitment campaign continues and Thames Valley Police are still actively seeking more applicants.

We are looking for confident, level-headed team players with a mature and positive outlook on life.

A good PCSO is able to communicate and empathise with people from different backgrounds

in a range of situations and is approachable and able to focus on the needs of the community.
