# LETTER FROM AMERICA

Many thanks to Tina Roberts (currently ex Keetos) for their observations of life in Long Island. We've a second extract ready for next month. Here then, is the first part of Tina's "letter from America":

Back in February 1999, Mark came home from work with 'An offer we simply couldn't refuse'. This offer meant packing up our two children, George then aged 5 and Catherine then 3, the entire contents of our home and moving 3,000 miles around the world to Long Island, New York.

After 6 months of frantic preparation we found ourselves in said location with all our worldly goods packed into 4 suitcases and 8 large boxes which we had taken with us. The rest was in a very large container which, natural disasters allowing, would arrive by ship 3 weeks later.

Upon our arrival to the US of A, we made the following alarming discoveries:

- 1. Several letters of the English alphabet had been lost when the original settlers moved over. The words labor, neighbor, color have had a letter dropped and words like theater have had letters transposed. Words take on different meanings. On a recent trip to the hairdresser I was asked if I would like my 'bangs' done. When I asked 'what's a bang?' he replied '\$6'. I later discovered that a bang is a fringe.
- 2. Measurement had also become somewhat altered. A pint contains 16 fluid oz. over here and a gallon is 6 UK Pints. 6 pints of petrol costs about 95p (1:26p per real gallon).
- 3. The ability to brew beer with any taste seems to escape the Americans although we find Bud to be an excellent laxative.
- 4. Wine and liquor is not sold at supermarkets. Instead, the local liquor store stocks many fine (?) wines, mostly Californian Chardonnay. Great unless you happen to run dry on a Sunday when all liquor and beer stores are closed. All purchases must be placed in a brown paper bag and hidden from sight.
- 5. The Yanks don't seem to be able to drink as much as us Brits, probably due to the lack of tasty beers and wines. When we order a bottle of wine in a restaurant we usually end up being given one glass and a 'you must be alcoholics' look when we try to set things right.
- 6. They are obsessed with telling you to 'Have a nice day'. Not that they give two hoots if you do or not.
- 7. Flags another obsession. In garages, shops, on the side of the road. EVERYWHERE! One rule the Stars and Stripes must be highest flag on the

# NATURE NOTES

#### Is it a woat or a steasel?

Normally seen racing across a road at high speed around West Ilsley, stoats or weasels can be really difficult to identify. So how can you tell them apart? As the well-worn old saying goes "One is weaslily identified and the other is stoatally different"!

In reality they are actually guite similar in appearance especially when you see them flying across a road. Stoats have a long thin tail with a distinct bristly black tip and are between 25 to 45cm (10 to 18in) in length. Weasels on the other hand are generally smaller, although there can be an overlap in size with stoats. They are 20 to 30cm (8 to 12in) long, but have a shorter tail with no black tip. It is perhaps by their tails that they can be most easily identified when crossing the road. In winter stoats can grow a white coat which was sought after as ermine fur, while weasels never had this problem.

Recent studies showed that stoat diets consisted of 65% rabbits, 16% voles and wood mice, and 17% birds and birds eggs. Weasel diets however, were made up of 25% rabbits, 68% voles and wood mice, and 5% birds and birds eggs. Perhaps surprisingly, and unfortunately, neither of them often take rats as prey.

# UP AND UNDER

Any reader who is familiar with the beautifully situated Watermill Theatre in Bagnor will know that it is the venue for some extraordinarily successful and well-known plays, this despite the limitation of its very small stage and the relatively low number of seats. That small stage area leads the players to some amazingly complex stage directions and not infrequently the play continues on the lawns outside during the half-time interval; this is always a great favourite with the audience.

However, last Thursday was a real treat. "Up and Under" is a comedy about a no-hoper Rugby Team fielded by The Wheatsheaf Pub in the annual 7-a-side tournament. Some idea of their difficulties can be summed up by the fact that they can muster only three players. A former star player, incensed by the ease with which the annual champions acquire the trophy largely through the use of imported and expensive players, places a bet with the competitor's financial backing that he can train a no-hoper to win the competition. Given the opportunity to name "any team - go on, any team" on which our hero can exercise his skills, "Mr Big" selects The Wheatsheaf and to spice up the bet our man is forced to put his money where his mouth is, in the shape of the family home! Honour demands though that he carry it through and this forms the basis of the entire play.

The addition of a personal trainer plus the former star brings the number of available players to five and they go on to face the Champions, though this is achieved with a "fix" that gives them a bye into the thrilling final. Along the way we witness the hard work, training, and humour that accompanies the task; what is truly astonishing, though, is the way in which five people can take that stage area at the Windmill and yet make you feel you are witnessing a very much larger arena. I lost count of the number of times I ducked when the ball was "kicked!"

By the time this review comes out the play will, I believe, have finished, so I hope I am not spoiling anyone's fun to tell you that they lost the bet in a thrilling, last-kick final – the real winner was clearly the rugby itself and they determined to have another go "next year." If so, I do hope they return to the Watermill to play it!

The next production is Carmen – and if you haven't got tickets yet, I would recommend that you get some soon. The run has already been extended by an extra week to cope with demand and it promises to be a wonderful and entertaining production. The Watermill also does post-show meals in their Restaurant and the bar and garden setting is wonderful; despite the bypass nearby I have never noticed any roar of traffic,

which at one time appeared to threaten the theatre's very existence.

The Evergreens detail elsewhere in this publication their plans to visit for an afternoon matinee of Carmen – they would welcome more guests if you can make it and I promise you will not be disappointed.
