



## REPORT TO THE ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL ASSEMBLY

Due to a senior moment, I missed the Annual Parish Assembly and so the report for All Saints Church was not made. I was reminded of that recently and it is only right that I should give my report here, belatedly, via the West IIsley News.

Since last year's assembly, the benefice has seen the arrival of Revd Trevor Maines and his wife Olive, installed in the rectory at Peasemore to fill the gap left after Antonia Cretney's departure. Together with this appointment, there has been a restructuring of the benfice, with our group joining Brightwalton and Chaddleworth, with Revd. John Townend being in overall charge.

The church in our village continues to grow, albeit slowly, with the numbers on the electoral roll now standing at 29. It maintains varying types of service, from the traditional communion to more informal "All Age" worship. It provides an important anchor within the village for hatches, matches and dispatches, something most people would acknowledge as being important. It has, over the year, provided a number of social events, raising money for the general fund as well as the specific restoration appeal.

It will be of no surprise to anyone that our efforts have largely revolved around the "Raising of the Roof" appeal. Our target is to raise £45,000 for re-roofing ion 2006. We are well on the way to meeting this and are now in a strong position to be applying for grants.

Finally, I am getting round to my "Feeding the Five Thousand Fiver", the task some of the village took on when the Roof Appeal was launched.

### NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH Fred Carter

Plan for 'Super Force' must not be at the expense of neighbourhood policing

The National Neighbourhood Watch Assoc. is to launch a grassroots consultation exercise in order to gauge the views of neighbourhood watch members following the publication of radical plans to re-



draw the map of policing in England and Wales.

A new report by Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabularies concludes that when it comes down to policing "size matters". It finds that in critical areas of police work such as counter terrorism, organised crime and serious crime, many of the existing 43 police forces in England and Wales are not up to the job.

"Put simply, the 43 – force structure is no longer fit for purpose. In the interest of the efficiency and the effectiveness of policing it should change," says the author of the report, Denis O'Connor, a member of Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabularies.

The study concentrates on what is known in policing circles as level two "protective services". These are

major crime incidents that cross police borders and boundaries. In comparison, at neighbourhood level the report finds that a "new professionalism" has resulted in police resources successfully targeting and getting on top of local crime.

The report says "The existing structure is over 30 years old. It matches local government structures and has emphasised the need to drive down volume crime and provide local policing with considerable success.

"In creating a structure that is fit for purpose the overall goals should be the creation of organisations that are large enough to provide a full suite of sustainable services yet small enough to be able to relate local communities."

The report argues that the current "basic command unit" of police stations in England and Wales would be unaffected by the reorganisation at force level. "Local arrangements will not change," says the report.

However, a study of all 43 forces in terms of their ability to deal with major crime produced some stark findings. Very few forces fully met expected standards when it came to tackling the threat from terrorist and organised crime. "Larger forces are likely to have a much greater capability and resilience whilst smaller forces in many cases find it hard to provide services to acceptable standards" writes Denis O'Conner in his report.

The benchmark, according to the report, is to have police forces of at least 4,000 officers. If this recommendation was adopted by the government it would result in at least 13 of the smaller, existing forces, primarily covering rural areas, disappearing under a restructuring that would create around 30 "super forces".

NNWA Chairman Roy Rudham has announced a major consultation exercise among the neighbourhood watch movement to gauge grassroots reaction to the plans for restructuring police forces.

He said" One of the roles of NNWA is to represent the views on neighbourhood watch members on policing to government.

"Any changes must ensure that we have police forces that are big enough to cope with the threats posed nationwide by organised crime and terrorism but at the same time are small enough to care about crime on our doorstep.

Re-drawing the police map must not mean diverting resources away from dealing with neighbourhood crime in order to bridge the gap in policing major crime and disorder.

## WIN WALKS walking in the neighbourhood Fred Carter



Two circular walks around West Ilsley....2 or 5 miles

Start by the Harrow Public House and walk down Main Street towards East Ilsley. Take the public footpath that runs between the old Post Office and The Poplars at the end of the

path bear right and take the metalled road towards West Ilsley Stables...just before the entrance to the stables take the bridleway on the right that crosses a cattle grid and bears left around the back of the stables, after about 200 metres ignore the path that goes to the right, bear slightly left and continue straight ahead uphill, the path bears right and continues to a T junction.

For the short walk turn right at this junction and walk uphill towards Hodcott Copse, at the T junction at the top of the hill turn right and follow he bridleway back to West Ilsley Stables, pause on the top of the rise above the stables to get a magnificent view of the village nestling in the valley below,. At the bottom of the hill turn left and return along the metalled road to West Ilslev.

For the longer walk take the short path to the left at this junction to another T junction. Turn right here and after about 200 metres look for a path on your right hand side. Follow this path until it reaches a metalled road (Old Street) turn right along this

metalled road until it turns left at this point continue straight ahead along a footpath to join the Catmore Road. Turn right here and when the road turns sharp right continue straight ahead into Park Wood....ignore the footpath that crosses the path after about 500 metres and take the next path on the right hand side that skirts along the side of a field edge towards Starveall Farm....There are some excellent views of the village from here.....continue down the track past the farm to join the Farnborough Road, turn right on the road towards the Harrow.

This is a particularly beautiful walk during Bluebell time but beware some of the path can be muddy after rain.

## CRIME REPORT

Crime reports:

#### **Crime Report 13 October**

On or about 3<sup>rd</sup> October a handbag containing credit cards was stolen from a shopping trolley in Somerfields Hungerford. Unfortunately inside the handbag were the 'PIN' numbers for the cards and cash withdrawals have been made. Unattended handbags and wallets in shopping trolleys are easy pickings and to find a credit card with its PIN number neatly written down on a piece of paper is like Christmas and birthdays rolled into one for the thief. Remember always keep cards and PIN's separate.

There have been a number people coming into the Lambourn Office asking the question "Is it illegal to use a mobile phone whilst riding a horse?"

The actual legislation applies to driving a motor vehicle and does not include horses. However though I'm not an accomplished equestrian I would think it unwise to use a mobile whilst riding.

Some personnel changes at the Station see the arrival of Inspector Peter Edwards as the new Neighbourhood Inspector whilst Inspector Toby Barrett has moved onto pastures new at Reading.

### 20<sup>th</sup> Oct

Hungerford, being a predominately rural area does I'm afraid suffer from rural crime and the past week has proved no exception.

Between Friday and Saturday a horse box was stolen from a property in West Ilsley and probably during the same night a seven foot hardwood gate was also stolen from a paddock in the village.

During the night of Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> and Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> riding tack was stolen from a farm in Brightwalton and a farm in Hermitage.

Two bronze statues of a 'buck and roe deer' were stolen from the garden of a house in Woodland St Mary between 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> October.

Over the past couple of weeks domestic fuel oil has been siphoned from a house in Farnborough. If you have this type of heating be aware of this as many people will be filling their tanks at this time of year for the coming winter and theft is a cheaper option to the thief rather than paying the rising oil prices.

#### 27<sup>th</sup> Oct

Between Tuesday and Friday three burglaries have taken place, two in Great Shefford and one in Eddington Hungerford. On each occasion entry has been gained by forcing rear UPVC doors. Please be aware of this, make sure all doors and windows are securely locked and don't leave garden tools lying around.
