The Great Men Only Challenge!

As you blokes were so good at making scones last year, we have set a new challenge for you this year. The West Ilsley Show 2003 men-only competition is to make MUFFINS. There will be a tenner for the best entry so strap on your pinnies! Don't worry they are dead easy to make, and the less time you spend on them, the better they usually turn out. The stakes are already hotting up. There is talk of revenge, secret recipes, spoiling tactics, bribery and corruption...... As usual, I will give you a head start with suggested recipes and a few hints and tips for the perfect muffin. Knowing how you blokes love to experiment with flavours, you may want to try your own recipe. I cannot guarantee that the judge will agree to taste baked bean and marmite muffins though, so be warned.

Banana Muffins

Makes about 10 in a standard muffin tin or in individual paper cake cases.
10 oz (280g) self raising flour
1 tsp (5ml) bicarbonate of soda ½ tsp of salt
3 large, well ripened bananas giving 8-10 fl oz / 240-290 ml when peeled and mashed
5 oz (140g) caster sugar
1 egg beaten with a fork
2-3 fl oz (60-90 ml) milk
3 fl oz vegetable oil or 3 oz melted butter
Heat the oven to 200 deg C for a conventional oven, 180 deg C for a fan oven or Gas mark 6.

- In a large bowl, sift the flour, bicarbonate of soda and salt
- In a separate bowl mash the bananas. Stir in the sugar, egg, milk and oil/butter.
- Pour all of the wet ingredients into the dry. Stir until no trace of dry flour is visible.
- Spoon into paper cases or muffin tins. to about three quarters full. Bake for 20-25 mins until tops are lightly browned and spring back when pressed gently.

Chocolate Muffins

Makes 10 in a standard muffin tin or individual paper cases

9 oz (225g) self raising flour 1 tsp (5ml) bicarbonate of soda ½ (2.5ml) teaspoon of salt 5 oz (140g) of caster sugar 4 tbsp (60ml) cocoa powder 1 egg

9 fl oz (260ml) milk

1 tsp (5ml) vanilla essence 3fl oz (90ml) vegetable oil or 3oz (85g) melted butter 3oz (85g) plain chocolate chips

- Heat oven to 200 deg C, 180 deg C fan oven or gas mark 6.
- Sift flour, bicarbonate of soda, salt sugar, cocoa powder and chocolate chips together in a large bowl.
- In another bowl, beat the egg with a fork, stir in the vanilla and milk followed by the oil/melted butter.
- Pour the wet ingredients into the dry. Stir until just combined.
- Fill the muffin tin/paper cases three quarters full. Bake for 20-25 mins.

Here are a few hints and tips for perfect muffins. First of all make sure that your flour is fresh. Do not leave out the bicarbonate of soda, it is important to get a good rise - and make sure it is not out of date! It is important that you do not over-mix when you incorporate the wet ingredients into the dry ones. Mixing should take no longer than 30 seconds with a metal spoon and the mixture should still look lumpy. There should be no trace of dry flour though. If using a metal muffin tin, then oil the base only as this will encourage the sides to rise to give a taller muffin. The perfect muffin should have a raised, symmetrical top and straight sides. If the muffins turn out hard and small, then your mix was probably too thick, or your flour or the bicarbonate of soda stale. If the muffin spreads sideways instead of up, then your mixture is too runny. If the top of the muffin is pointed and distorted, this indicates that the oven was too hot. Make them on the morning of the show as they are best eaten fresh.

Good luck and may the best man win.

Produce Show

Don't forget, it is free to enter and the produce show is the heart of the village show., so please make an effort. It is much easier to register your entry this year. Simply write down the category number and your first name and surname on the labels provided and stick them to the underside of your entry. Children should put their age on the label too. The category lists will be posted in the marquee, so don't worry if you forget. Entries will not be accepted after 1pm and judging will be completed by 2pm. There will be cash prizes for the best children's exhibits. Cups will also be awarded for the overall winners in the homecrafts, flowers and ornamentals and fruit and vegetables categories. Make sure your garden is looking good as there will be a cup for the best garden and best hanging basket (as seen from the road). You don't need to enter for this, the judges will be making their decision one week before the show. If last years' cup winners could return their cups to Tanglewood one week before the show, we would be grateful. Lat years' winners were Mrs Pearman (Colling Cup),, N. Fielder (Sheila Hearn Rosebowl), Walton Cup (Sandra Carlisle), Country Garden's Cup (Denis Gilmour) and Millennium Cup (Toni Sugden).

The categories for this year's show are published here again, the more entrants we have for each category, the more likely we are to have new faces winning the coveted 1st places.

Flowers and vegetables are easy to grow and are always popular. Homecrafts are always popular, but we would like to see more entrants, especially sewing, knitting and upholstery. The flower arrangements are spectacular and almost anyone can take part,

The photograph competition was a great success last year, so get your cameras out and take lots of photographs of IIsley, family, holidays and all of the other categories.

The judging for the best garden and best hanging basket will be judged from the road and the winners will be announced at the Fete, so get your baskets out, cut the grass, weed the beds and you may well be a winner.

Editors' note: we contacted the police to ask what the MPS is all about, and this is what we received: "The Mobile Police Station is a purpose built mobile unit commissioned and paid for by Thames Valley Police and Sovereign Housing Association. Its main function is to visit the rural area's of West Berkshire providing;

- a highly visible police presence
- manned by a uniformed police officer
- a local Police Station to visit
- crime prevention advice
- local on site surgeries in partnership with Sovereign Housing
- providing reassurance to the public
- general information and advice

The Mobile Police Station is an operational resource capable of being deployed to major incidents across the force, i.e. Murder scenes, Missing persons and Fatal road traffic accidents."
