## PARISH COUNCIL UPDATES

Following the advertising of the two vacancies on West Ilsley Parish Council, the council is now able to co-opt to fill these vacancies.

The council intends to hold a meeting on 18<sup>th</sup> April to co-opt to the council. If you would like to apply to join the council, please could you email some information on why you would like to join the council and what life experience you could bring to the council by 5pm on 11<sup>th</sup> April.

Please also check you meet the following criteria:

#### Legal qualifications for being a Parish Councillor

To qualify you must be able to answer 'Yes' to both of the following questions:

- Are you a British or Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of a European Union country?
- Are you 18 years of age or over?

To qualify you must be able to answer 'Yes' to at least one of the following questions:

- Are you on the Parish electoral register for the Parish of West IIsley?
- Have you lived in the Parish of West Ilsley, or within 3 miles of its boundary, for at least a year?
- Have you been the owner or tenant of land or other premises in the Parish of West Ilsley for at least a year?
- Have you had your principal or only place of work in the Parish of West Ilsley for at least a year?

DISQUALIFICATIONS

You must be able to answer 'No' to all of the following questions to be eligible to serve as a Councillor:

- Are you the subject of a bankruptcy restriction order or interim order?
- Have you, within the last five years, been convicted of an offence in the UK, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man, which resulted in a sentence of imprisonment (whether suspended or not) for a period of three months or more without option of a fine?

Disqualification from being elected a member is set out in Section 80 of the Local Government Act 1972 Please email <u>clerk@westilsley.org</u> Kind regards,



## MALTHOUSE WELL.

After a very wet February, when we had 44% more rain than average, March has been a little kinder to us with around 89mm of rain which is quite close to its long-term average. However, the Malthouse well water level has not gone down as expected. At the beginning of the month it read around 3.90 metres below ground level, and for some reason it has even risen slightly during March. As we go to press on 25<sup>th</sup> March it reads 3.63 metres below ground level. As the graph below shows this is very different to 2014

where, once the groundwater level had peaked in February 2014, it descended steadily without any fluctuation as we progressed into Summer. Whereas in 2024 the graph shows the water level is stubbornly flat-lining throughout February and March.

The good news is that some, but not all, cellar owners have been able to stop pumping out their cellars in the last few days. Hopefully we'll have a warm April, the ground water level will drop, and all the owners with still wet cellars can stop pumping. Roll on Spring...



#### **COUNTRY NOTES**

You may be aware of the amazing and mysterious lifecycle of eels? Born in the Sargasso Sea in the Bermuda Triangle, they swim and drift thousands of miles to end up in the rivers of Europe, where they stay for 5 to 20 years before heading back to the Sargasso Sea to spawn, finding their way to a place where they started life as an egg.



Eels were once superabundant in Europe and a major food source. When William the Conqueror invaded England in 1066 and set about trying to work out exactly what he owned he found that people were paying the rent on their property to the church and noblemen in

eels. This practice continued for hundreds of years, until England had a proper currency.

Eel populations have been in decline for about 40 years. Since the 1980s we have been receiving less than 5% of the baby eels compared to the period between the 1960s and 1980s. This is a pretty

catastrophic decline, and the eel is now considered to be Critically Endangered. The reason why eel populations crashed is still unclear. It is probably down to several things: over-fishing, predation, physical barriers stopping them reaching habitat, pollution and pumping stations sucking in eels ...and the inevitable climate change.

For the last 20 years, all around Europe, people have been working to try and improve eel stocks by building eel passes around physical barriers. One thing that they do in Germany and France, but which we haven't done in England, is stock eels. In principle this should be a good idea because you are spreading eels around, putting them upstream of weirs.

This week I helped to introduce 162 elvers (young eels) into the River Pang between Tidmarsh & Pangbourne. Another 850 have been released upstream near Bradfield & Englefield. Over the next four years the eels will be monitored each autumn to check on how they are progressing. **Geoff Wond**

## EASTER GREETINGS FROM FR. MATTHEW

Christ is Risen! Alleluia!



All around us the world is bursting forth into bloom (cold showers permitting!), the darkness is lifting, and the days lengthening. There's deep

wisdom in the Church's celebration of the Resurrection at such a time, when nature herself prompts us to rejoice and anticipate that yet-moreglorious Spring ripening to an eternal Summer without end in the Kingdom of the Father. The flowers thrusting themselves up from the warming earth will, we know, wither and fade, as we will ourselves, in time. But the eternal life Jesus won for us on the Cross, whose mysteries we've celebrated in Holy Week, will never fade: there we will be warmed by no faltering English sunshine, nor overshadowed by those topresent English clouds, but we will rejoice in the radiance of the Father Himself, "Who dwells in unapproachable light" (1 Tim. 6:16).

We anticipate that eternal festival by prolonging our Easter celebrations for 50 days - longer than Lent! with a succession of feasts to keep up our festal cheer. This year the Annunciation (normally 25<sup>th</sup> March) finds itself shifted all the way to 8<sup>th</sup> April, a reminder of where this great story began. Our great patron, St. George, and the holy Apostle St. Mark enliven the 23<sup>rd</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> of April. Easter Sundays succeed each other until The Ascension of Our Lord, this year on the 9<sup>th</sup> May marking 40 days since the Resurrection. The great Feast of Pentecost falls on Sunday 19th May, and Trinity Sunday the week after, on the 26<sup>th</sup>. We celebrate the great missionary to these lads, St. Augustine of Canterbury, on the 27<sup>th</sup> May, before we prepare for Corpus Christi - the Feats of the Body and Blood of Jesus – on the 30<sup>th</sup> May (often celebrated on the Sunday following).

What a burden of feasting, rejoicing, and praise! We hope very much that you'll join us in celebrating! Sunday Masses in the parish are at St. Mary's, East Hendred, at 9.30am (with children's liturgy in term time), St. Patrick's, East Ilsley, at 11.15am, and back in East Hendred for 6pm. #### VILLAGE HALL ACTIVITY

An **Exercise/ Fitness class** is being offered to the residents of West IIsley (and surrounding areas). This is part of an outreach programme run by 'Everyone Active' (Leisure provider) on behalf of West Berks.

The class would be held in the village hall and is aimed at both men & women who are retired but as we are a small community it is also be open to all age groups. The day & time being offered is **Tuesday mornings** at 10.30 and it would be a 45 minute session with the chance to stay for a coffee & a chat afterwards.

The instructor is proposing a circuit-type activity class where each person can exercise at their own pace and ability under guidance. This is for anyone & any level but particularly beginners. The **main aim is to get more people active** particularly for those living in areas with little access to leisure facilities. The classes are being offered at a subsidised rate of only £3 per session (including coffee). These classes are being offered to start after Easter.
