Thursday 22 and Friday 23 July

Many of you know that I run Animal Keeper Courses at Beale Park throughout the year. The courses are always popular and get booked up very quickly so I am running one for West Ilsley children and their friends. The children are dropped off (and left with me so you get a few days off) at 10.30 and collected at 4pm. We'll spend our time feeding and mucking out Baxter's Farm, from ponies and donkeys to chickens and ducks. All the animals need their daily exercise and grooming. During the two days the children not only develop their knowledge of animals but also the confidence to handle them correctly. Wear old clothes and wellies and bring a picnic lunch. If the weather is good then we often take a dip in the paddling pool at the end of a hard day's work!! Be prepared to work hard and have lots of fun. The Great Men Only Challenge!

The challenge is on! The West IIsley Show 2004 menonly competition is to make SCONES. Any flavour you like, but please take pity on the poor judge who will be tasting them. No scone will be wasted – those not consumed will be sold off as door stops or paper weights. There will be a tenner for the best entry so strap on your pinnies! Don't worry they are dead easy to make, and the less time you spend on them, the better they usually turn out. The stakes are already hotting up. There is talk of revenge, secret recipes, spoiling tactics, bribery and corruption....... As usual, I will give you a head start with a recipe and a few hints and tips for the perfect scone. You need to bring at least four scones for judging – paper plates will be provided.

Traditional Scones

225g (8oz) self raising white flour

pinch of salt 5ml (1tsp) baking powder 40g (1 1/2 oz) firm butter or margarine cut into pieces 150ml (1/4 pint) milk beaten egg or milk to glaze

Method

Sift the flour, salt and baking powder together into a bowl. Rub in the butter, or whizz in a processor until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Mix in the milk to form a soft dough, or whizz briefly in a processor until a dough ball forms. Take care not to over-mix. Roll out dough on a lightly floured surface to 2-3cm thickness. Cut out rounds using a 6cm pastry cutter. Press down with the cutter and try not to twist it, or the scone will not rise as well. Gently push the scone out of the cutter on to a greased baking sheet. Re-roll the trimmings to make as many as you can. Brush the tops with beaten egg or milk and bake in a pre-heated oven at 220 deg C, 210 deg C if you have a fan oven, or gas mark 7 for 12 to 15 minutes until golden brown and well risen. If you want your scones to rise well, handle them gently and resist the temptation to open the oven before they are cooked!

For cheese scones, sift 5ml(1tsp) of mustard powder with the dry ingredients. Then stir in 50g (2oz) finely grated cheddar cheese just before you add the milk to make the dough. After glazing, sprinkle the tops with a little extra cheese.

So, good luck, no cheating by getting the wife or mother in law to make them, and may the best man win.
