#### FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

The outbreak of Foot and Mouth Disease has caused many commentators to blame modern intensive farming methods and to link the disease with BSE.

The disease had been eradicated from the UK, and thus must have been brought in from another country which still has the FMD. It is not caused by modern farming, if anything animals kept on an extensive system are more likely to be exposed to the virus, and even organic units have been victims. However, once FMD was established in the UK, it was spread much more quickly to all parts of the country than in previous outbreaks because of the vastly improved transport system that we have today - the distances travelled by animals has come as a surprise to many people, even in the farming industry.

The irony of the situation is that British farming is controlled by ever increasing numbers of assurance schemes and codes of conduct relating to welfare and production methods, which obviously increase the costs of production. This makes British produce relatively expensive, and our reaction to this is to import food from parts of the world which have no such standards, and as we have seen to our cost, even from countries where FMD is endemic.

#### THE USE OF FOOTPATHS DURING THE FMD CRISIS

The farmers of the village would like to express our thanks to everybody for keeping off the rights of way during the Foot and Mouth Disease crisis - we realise it has caused a lot of inconvenience, especially to dog owners.

The measures, and probably a good deal of luck, have so far managed to keep the disease away from the immediate vicinity, although the 'infected area' starts just outside the parish boundaries.

We are hopeful that the situation will ease fairly soon, and we are keen to identify those paths which can be used at minimal risk to livestock. However, at the time of writing, the West Berks Council will not approve the easing of restrictions, although we are expecting guidance in the near future.
