TENNIS

This has been a good year for the Tennis Court so far – the weather has been kind and new tennis heroes such as Tim Henman have generated a lot of enthusiasm, especially with the young adults and children. Altogether, some 154 bookings have already been made for the court this year.

The court surface is standing up to this well, although the booking clerk keeps a strong and watchful eye on correct footwear being worn. It is worth repeating that the fees are £1.50 per adult per hour and 75p for children under 16. Bookings are done, preferably by phone, in advance, 10 am to 10 pm daily, or at the veterinary surgery 01635 281344.

I noted that in the published discussion at the recent Parish Council meeting some criticism was levelled at the veterinary surgery as being "less convenient" than the Harrow for location of the key and that booking arrangements "had then worked better". This is unkind and unfair comment especially when made by people who don't book the court for tennis! Elaine, along with Julia, is one of the best booking clerks we have had and arrangements for obtaining and returning the key are quite simple. Granted, the veterinary emergency telephone line swings into action after 7.30 pm and at weekends but the situation is soon sorted. At least no one has been booked in by mistake as a Tom Cat op yet!! The reason the key was changed over from the Harrow (just before the new incumbents) was due to a tightening up of rules and regulations for the court needed to preserve its playing integrity. In the past keys have gone missing and we had one character who turned up several months later with a "lost" key saying he had been playing regularly but didn't realise he had to pay!

Those free and easy days have gone – but it is still simple to book an enjoyable game of tennis – why not try it.

The W.I.R.& S.A. (or Village Hall Committee as it is better known) had a busy meeting on the 17th August.

On arrival, Members were amazed at the transformation of the Hall's stock of Card Tables - Now totally refurbished and good enough for use at 'Crockfords' - and all thanks to ALEC COLES who carried out the work...for which the Members passed a huge vote of thanks

The Hall roof (the condition of which has been a cause for concern for a long time) is to be repaired and retiled over the main sections and, from four Tenders received, the work was awarded to Heritage Roofing Ltd of Lambourn Woodlands. The work will cost £4,484 ex V.A.T. and an application will be made to West Berkshire Council for a grant. . . and any other donations will be greatly accepted.

Treasurer Audrey Tizzard reported that Hall bookings for the next quarter are reasonably good but more bookings can now be accommodated and the Committee is hopeful that greater regular use than hitherto will develop.
