both Editors with regard to the speed with which traffic sometimes travels through the Village. This is particularly true of the "Post Office Straight" (as I now call it) where the road is seldom narrowed by parked cars, particularly during the day, and injudicious use of the accelerator can result in a fairly hairy "S-Bend" manoeuvre as cars pass Forge Cottage and round the bend in front of the Bungalows. With horses, ponies, both young and older children and pedestrians all present at various times throughout the day, it is incumbent on all of us to set a good example to visitors by ensuring that we drive carefully, safely, and slowly and with regard to potential hazards (and certainly within the speed limit). All of us, I suspect, would privately admit that we are perhaps sometimes remiss in our attention to this detail and we must therefore be careful to fit toughened glass before launching stones (as the proverb has it). Not only does the whole Village gain as a result but our good example may with luck encourage others more cavalier in their attitude to our safety to moderate their speed.

'ELLO ELLO ELLO' Sergeant Rob Athawes Community Policing Team, Hungerford

GENERAL INTEREST

We have had an increase in Burglaries to sheds and out houses, particularly in the Parishes North of the Motorway, on the Hungerford Police Sector this last month. I would urge you all, if you have valuable tools and electrical goods stored in out buildings, that you do all you can to make sure that your security is 'top notch'. You can do many things to help, including fitting relatively cheap alarm systems, even to garden sheds, that would make even the bravest thief head for the hills if the alarm was activated in the middle of the night. Heavy duty padlocks and chains also help because, lets face it, if your security is good, but your next door neighbour's is poor, which shed is the potential thief going to attack??

HARE COURSING

We are also getting inundated with hare coursers at present and, to be honest, we have rarely got sufficient resources to be able to deal with this type of problem. The coursers have been coming out in numbers recently, about 30 were counted a few days ago in the Hungerford area and they will hit an area hard for a short time and then move on. Unfortunately for the farmers amongst you, hares are common on our chalky downland areas and seem to thrive. That in turn, obviously, attracts the coursers and their dogs, many of which, are simply abandoned after a day's work due to, either, severe injuries from chasing the hares across flint filled fields, or simply because they lose their owners who have little or no regard for the dog's welfare. There are things that can be done to reduce the opportunity. The most important course of action for the land owner, if he doesn't want these people on his land, is to plough the field as quickly as possible once a crop has been harvested. Coursers are reluctant to 'run' their dogs on ploughed fields as the opportunities for catching the hares is greatly reduced. The biggest problem to the farmer is the damaged fencing and crops, so the more you can do, as far as prevention is concerned, the better.

CHIEFS VISIT

The new chief Constable of Thames Valley Police, Mr Peter Neyroudl attended Hungerford last week and I had the privilege of taking him out on foot patrol around the town. I think he was the first Chief to visit the Hungerford Sector since 1987 so it was an honour indeed. It also gave the chance for the press and our own staff to quiz the chief about various matters and it gave me the opportunity ask him about the police manning levels in rural areas!!

RESULTS

I am happy to report that we have had some excellent results again over the last month or so.

A couple of weeks ago we carried out a drugs raid in Hungerford on two separate addresses and seized 20 cultivated cannabis plants. Two persons were arrested and dealt with accordingly. My colleague PS Banfield arrested a woman from Lambourn yesterday 7/10/2002 who was charged with 8 offences relating to drugs matters including the supply of heroin, the supply of ecstasy and the supply of cannabis. If found guilty in court, she is likely to be looking at a lengthy term of imprisonment.

CCTV in Hungerford helped with an excellent arrest of an offender who was seen breaking into cars in the town centre. This was supported by a member of public who went out of his way to help identify the suspect and made an excellent statement relating to what he had seen. This has secured a conviction for an offender who has a string of previous convictions, who, hopefully won't return to Hungerford.

We have had numerous arrests for Drink driving which appears to be on the increase, throughout the police sector. All I can say about this is what I have emphasised in the past is that drink driving not only KILLS, but there is also a strong possibility that you will lose your licence when caught. Think about it!!!

After a fairly large disturbance in Hungerford last weekend 4 persons were arrested and all charged with a variety of offences, including criminal damage and public order offences.

Finally two other adult males have been arrested, one from Great Bedwyn and one from Great Shefford, both for drugs possession offences. <u>Be warned that we DO</u> stop, check and search individuals, if the circumstances fit and persons DO get arrested and charged. One to remember is that unlawful possession of Cannabis is still arrestable at present, contrary to some people's beliefs!!!!!
