Road Safety in West IIsley Presentation at the Annual Assembly

Annual Assembly The Parish Council was delighted to welcome Glyn Davis, Project Engineer of the



Engineer of the West Berkshire Traffic Management & Road Safety Team to the Annual Parish Assembly as part of the Council's 2007 Road Safety Campaign.

He reminded us that if a car hits you doing 20 mph you have a 95% chance of surviving, at 30 mph it is 55% and if you get struck at 40 mph then you have a 15% chance of living. He reported statistics that state that nearly 90% of pedestrians who survive being hit by a car doing 30 mph will sustain serious injuries and that traffic is the biggest killer of 15-19 year-olds, and the second biggest killer of children aged 5-14.

Positive Action

We have encouraged the Road Safety Team to database our concerns regarding the speed of cars through the village and are therefore pleased to report that traffic monitoring equipment will be set up at four locations in the village within the next few weeks to record the speed and frequency of traffic. Once this has been analysed we will discuss with the Road Safety team the various options available to us to manage traffic through the village.

Traffic calming

Many of the more common measures such as speed bumps are obviously inappropriate for the village and indeed can only be used where street lighting is present, something else which is not on our 'wish list'. However at his presentation Glyn Davis described a number of other strategies that can be used including features such as gates at the entrances to the village (as we currently have at the Western approach); a Road Safety campaign van with portable speed indicator signs; enforcement action by the Police; and permanent Vehicle Activated Signs which tell the driver if they are exceeding the speed limit. With regard to the latter the West Berkshire team is in the process of arranging a site visit to the village to see if there is a suitable site for one of these signs. Whilst the Parish Council is keen to deploy whatever resources we can to improve road safety in the village we are mindful of the potential light pollution and detraction in amenity value of additional street furniture and so will carefully consider and consult before installing such a sign. 20s Plenty

My personal preference of a 20 mph limit is apparently as yet unenforceable by the police and is therefore not something that is being used by West Berkshire as a traffic control measure. I would however, via this article like to encourage villagers to pledge to drive through West Ilsley, and indeed through our neighbouring villages, at 20 mph. Not only does it make little difference to the time is takes to get anywhere (I have calculated that it adds about 30 seconds to the journey time from one end of the village to the other), it massively reduces the effect of an accident (see above) and also reduces noise pollution. It also obviously reduces the speed of any traffic behind you to 20mph. I would like to seek the co-operation of our neighbours so that we all drive through the local villages at 20mph. The Downlands 20s Plenty Campaign. I rather like the sound of that.

Feedback

In summary therefore we are extremely pleased with the progress we are making in improving road safety in West IIsley. I look forward to being able to share with you the data from the forthcoming survey and would welcome feedback on this subject from all villagers at the next Parish Council meeting on Monday July 9th.

THE RIDGEWAY & THAMES PATH

Join a guided walk to experience a National Trail in spring and summer

The Ridgeway and Thames Path Guided Events Programme, covering May to September 2007, is now available. The popular programme, produced by the National Trails Office, features a wealth of guided walks and events taking place on sections of both of these two National Trails. Experienced National Trails volunteers, local walking groups and representatives from other organizations lead the walks, the majority of which are free of charge. The programme features over 30 individual walks throughout the season which allow people to experience the beauty and variety of the countryside in different locations along a Trail. You can enjoy the scenery and wildlife and view features unique to each Trail - locks and watermills along the Thames or ancient castles and burial mounds along The Ridgeway. Some walks give opportunities for bird, butterfly or wild flower identification, or the odd spot of photography. There is also information on a range of sponsored/long distance events and where visitors can combine walking with other leisure activities steam or boat rides, watching swan-upping for example. The aim of the programme is to encourage visitors to the Trails and to showcase the very best that these National Trails have to offer. We try to include as much information as possible, providing details on length and difficulty of walk, whether suitable for children, if toilets and refreshments will be available, directions to the start, and other useful facts. Guided walks are a great way to get out and enjoy walking and to see some fantastic countryside that the Trails pass through. The National Trails Office maintains and promotes The Ridgeway and Thames Path through funding from Natural England and Highways Authorities. The Trails provide two clearly signed linear routes through many remote scenic and tranquil places in this busy part of England, including The Chilterns and North Wessex Downs Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Village CAMP OUT & BBQ

The Village Hall Committee are pleased to announce that the annual Village Camp Out will take place on Saturday June 23rd (from 3pm) and extend through to Sunday 24th (10am).



It will be centred round camping, with an afternoon activity around the camp and in the woods followed by a camp sleep over.

The aim of the Camp Out is to invite all West Ilsley villagers and ex villagers to enjoy a camp out together and for all ages to mix and socialise. Details as follows:

Part 1 – Saturday afternoon 3-6pm

Activites for children aged between 5 and 12 years old, who can be left, led by volunteers from the village.

5yrs Plus

Camp skills centred around the camp

OR

Adventure trek (minimum 2hr walk)

12yrs Plus

Welcome to come and help.

To conclude the afternoon at 5pm approximately, hot dog tea and marshmallows for all cooked on the fire.

Part 2 – Saturday 6pm to Sunday 10am

From 6pm the camp is prepared for the night and for those children staying a responsible adult should arrive. Tents are put up and we strongly recommend that this is done as a family activity after 6pm. We then enjoy a family BBQ supper in the evening (from 7pm).

Cook breakfast, take down camp, clean and tidy up. Finish 10am Sunday.

Open to all West Ilsley children of any age.

Part 1, all children from 5-12yrs can be left, but helpers welcome and needed.

Part 2, a responsible parent/adult/volunteer to accompany (on a ratio of no more than 1 adult to 4 kids), help out and sleep over from 6pm to 10am.

The camp site is located 1 mile outside West Ilsley. Take the Catmore road and follow the signs. Park inside the gate on the LHS.

All food and drink is included for Part 1. For Part 2 please bring your own supper. We shall have a BBQ fire going so we suggest you bring something to cook and your own refreshments. Juice and water will be available throughout plus tea/coffee, sugar, milk, cereal, bacon, bread and jam for the morning. Please bring anything else you wish to eat or drink. Adults bring your own – cork screw and barrel of bitter supplied!

There will be a charge this year (£10 per tent), and we do require your signed booking form in advance. Without this we cannot accept the child/ren. The weekend will go ahead whatever the weather!!

To join in, wear appropriate old clothing that you don't mind getting dirty or torn. For Part 2, the following kit is required.

- Tent for you and your child/ren.
- Thick sleeping bag/duvet and Sleeping mat (optional)
- Waterproof top and trousers
- Thick wool jumper or fleece
- Spare warm trousers, socks and long sleeved shirt
- Warm hat/gloves and good shoes or boots
- Torch
- Plastic mug, plate & bowl plus cutlery for you.
- Do not bring anything electrical, any money or excessive sweets.
