There is no simpler way of letting the emergency services know who to contact should you be involved in an accident than by using ICE.

The Editors

Standing for In Case of Emergency, ICE will allow ambulance crews and police officers to quickly contact a nominated person who can be informed of the incident.

- Type the acronym ICE followed by a contact name (for example, ICE - mum or ICE - David) into the address book of your mobile phone
- Save their phone number
- Tell your ICE contact that you have nominated them

After the very interesting and enlightening talk from Mr. Trotman, the Area Commander of the Thames Valley Police at the July Parish Council meeting, here are a few hints and tips on how you can help when a rave is imminent or in progress.

Look out for the signs

- Broken locks on gates to fields, this is so participants can gain easy access.
- Small new notices appearing on the sides of fields in the area, showing rave goers where to go. These notices tend to be small, on bright paper and pointing in an odd direction, across the field.

When you hear a rave

- Please contact the police, they need as many people as possible to ring and complain.
- When you ring please tell them how it is affecting your quality of life
 E.g. Keeping your children or you awake, upsetting your animals, making your dogs bark, unsettling your horses, etc.

If you see or hear anything unusual or suspicious please call 0845 505 505

It is the urgency and persistence of complaints from villagers that will bring the Police out quickly – so don't leave it to your neighbour, make that call too.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH Fred Carter

Warmer Days and Lighter Evenings

During these long warm evenings when one is working or just sitting in the garden there is a higher risk of opportunist burglars taking advantage of insecure doors and windows. It takes just seconds for a burglar



to enter your home and snatch any handy valuables and possibly your car keys. Please ensure that any unsupervised doors or windows are secure if you are working outside, also be careful about leaving garden tools outside as they could make it

far easier for a criminal to break into you house or shed.

Burglars Target High-Tech Gadgets New research has shown that burglars are shifting their attention away from large cumbersome items such as televisions and videos and now favour small high-value gadgets which are far easier to conceal and carry. Items currently in favour include such things as iPods, Mobile Phones and Digital Cameras. Three quarters of people in the UK now have mobile phones and one in five owns a digital camera.

However, burglars are still most likely to steal jewellery, cash and handbags. The number of burglaries where credit cards have been stolen from homes has trebled in the past decade, while thefts involving purses, handbags and wallets have doubled.

Properties with no security measures are most likely to be targeted followed by those with a young head of household and lone parents. Households with no security measures in place are nearly six times more likely to be victims of burglary than those with security, so it is important to take sensible preventative measures.

CRIME REPORT

Our thanks to PC Andrew Buckingham (Hungerford Police 08458 505 505) who emails us with his NWN article, from which we extract items which may be valuable in keeping villagers alert to what's going on in the area:

12 July: Crime prevention measures can be akin to that well known phrase 'To shut the stable door after the horse has bolted'. If I had a pound for every time someone has said "If only I'd locked the door, shut that window, or I was going to put a stronger lock on".....I would be a rich man by now!

The simple fact is that you don't have to go to extreme measures to protect your property, so forget the 'portcullis and drawbridge'. Often by adopting simple crime prevention techniques you can reduce your chances of becoming a victim. As the holiday season approaches many of us will be going away and leaving our houses unoccupied.

Consider the following:

- Every burglar is likely to be an opportunist. Make sure all doors and windows are locked before you leave.
- Set your house alarm if you have one.
- Remember to cancel milk papers and make use of the Royal Mail letter and parcel holding service.
- Ask your neighbour to keep an eye on your home. They could open and close curtains, switch lights on an off and bring in the wheelie bin. Maybe they could park their car on your drive. (I like that one because my neighbour has a really flash car!)
- Operate a timer switch for lights, radio and TV.
- Even cutting the lawn before you go away can make your house look occupied.
- Have your address stuck inside your suitcase and not visible outside.

As you can see, just a few simple precautions which hopefully will keep the stable door shut and stop that horse from bolting!!

Crime Report

Overnight between Saturday and Sunday a 6'x3' oil tank was stolen from the driveway of a house in Downend Chieveley. The thieves would have used a trailer or vehicle; did you see anything suspicious that night?



Between 10am and 3pm last Wednesday (6th) a house was broken into in Lambourn Woodlands. The offender used a ladder from the rear of the property to access a first floor window. Fortunately the alarm was activated and the offender made off.

Shortly after 1am on Wednesday (6th) offenders entered a house in Blandys Hill Kintbury via the rear patio door and stole a handbag which contained car keys.

A blue landrover was stolen which was found the following morning on its roof in Bell Lane Inkpen. It is possible that the thief could be local maybe you saw someone walking away from the car that morning?

Roads Policing are appealing for information after a 38year-old man was killed in a collision in Lambourn on Sunday.

At around 4pm the man was riding a green Kawasaki motorcycle along the High Street when it was in collision with a green VW Golf as it turned right out of Edwards Hill. The rider of the motorcycle was declared dead at the scene of the collision, the driver of the Golf was shocked but uninjured.
