Minutes

Minutes of the PC meetings of 18th April and 14th May are on the website – ed having trouble setting up a link at the moment so please look on the website for yourselves!

PC CHAIRMAN'S UPDATE

The Parish Council held two meetings on the 14th May, a regular council meeting which was followed by the Annual Parish Meeting.

Since the last Parish Council update in the WIN we have had two councillors leave the council, Clive

Hooker and Alan Muir. I would like to thank both of them for their time helping with village matters. The two vacancies have been filled by Rachel Hudson and Jonny Rayfield who have both been co-opted to the council.

The agenda for first meeting of the year is always focussed on process and procedural related items such as reviewing policies, inventory of assets, subscriptions to external bodies and more. All of these are available on the westilsley.org website.

A few items were discussed which may be of interest. We continue to record the speed of vehicles captured by the mobile speed indicator device which moves between each end of the village every three weeks. Moving forward the speed data will be submitted to West Berkshire Council to see whether there is justification to introduce speed calming measures in the future.

A request has been made to include Bury Lane as a SID location. West Berkshire Council has to approve each location and there is no obvious location which meets the location criteria. This is being investigated in more detail and a request will be made if a suitable site is identified.

We discussed whether the council should create an emergency plan. It was decided a plan which is general in scope was not needed at this time. In the event of an emergency there was a view villagers would pull resource and expertise together as needed. That said, consideration needs to be given to flooding. At the present time the village does not have a flood warden so I will be sending a request for volunteers soon.

The meeting was followed by the Annual Parish Meeting. The meeting is attended by representatives of various village groups. The written reports from each group represented will be uploaded to our website once they are finalised.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR UPDATE

Dear Residents

Last week (week beginning 13 May) I attended ordinary parish council meetings in Compton and Yattendon, and annual parish council meetings in West Ilsley and Frilsham, to give reports on my work. I attended a training session about adult social care. I also showed a representative of Project Groundwater around East Ilsley, and she spoke to Compton's flood warden Peter Callard. Project Groundwater supports communities to be more resilient to groundwater flooding. It is a six-year programme working with communities in nine high-risk flood areas of the Chiltern Hills and Berkshire Downs. I also attended a meeting in Hampstead Norreys with Thames Water. The village flood warden, parish chairman, residents

and I asked a lot of questions and received some very useful information. I have several pages of notes.

When the minutes of the 25th April Scrutiny Commission are published on the WBC website you will be able to see a lengthy report that I gave about flooding and sewage in the district. Newbury Town Councillor Steve Masters requested that WBC issue an 'abatement notice' against Thames Water for the 'statutory nuisance' caused by sewage on the streets. The council then issued a press release to say it was going to look for evidence again (residents, parish councillors and flood wardens have been sending them evidence for months).

It appears that the council will not be issuing an abatement notice. They have said instead that they will ask Thames Water to 'provide details of investment in sewage infrastructure since the floods in 2014' and that 'an action plan be put into place across West Berkshire to urgently resolve the sewage flooding and overflows into our waterways'. It is not clear what this 'action plan' will look like, who will write it, and by when. When Thames Water has come to Scrutiny (last October, and the autumn the previous year) they have told us about their plans. There are a lot of problems including the fact Victorian pipework was deliberately porous to allow groundwater to flush the system, and it is no longer fit for purpose; they can't line pipes and seal manhole covers to stop groundwater inundating the sewers when the groundwater is so high; and they are on the brink of bankruptcy. Meanwhile some roads and pavements are still covered in the scum of dried-up sewage and nobody will come and clean it. I think this issue is going to continue to dominate my work for some time to come...





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COUNTRY NOTES

Jackdaws walk across the close-cropped grass of the cricket pitch. One, perhaps an old male, smart in a charcoal grey suit, paler grey nape, greying temples, pale blue eyes, a handsome fellow. Reminds me of George Clooney.

I sit on one of the steps that climb through the herb garden, a favourite step that faces east, that catches the early morning sun. Soak up the sun's warmth, surrounded by rosemary, lovage, oregano and hyssop, inhaling air perfumed by essential oils, indulge in some aroma therapy.

Clumps of chives, planted to soften the steps hard edges, are in flower, their florets a subtle pinkish mauve, their pollen a bright orange. I know it is orange, not because I can see the pollen bearing stamens inside the flowers, but because I can see the orange bundles bulging in the pollen baskets of the bumble bees as they move from blossom to blossom. This giving up of pollen by the chive is not a purely altruistic act, it is one half of a symbiotic relationship between the flower and the bee; most of this protein rich pollen will be taken to feed the bee's young, but some will stick to its fur and will be transferred to other chive flowers, impregnating them, spreading the plant's genes, ensuring their future.
