NATURE NOTES

Seasons of mist and mellow fruitfulness.

In summer we rarely pay attention to the colour of leaves, but as Winter approaches Nature has one last fling and we are treated to a magnificent display as leaves change colour and fall.

Plants are green because they contain a pigment called chlorophyll and it is probably the best known of all the plant pigments. Pigments are vital to plants as they help to trap sunlight to provide the energy to convert carbon dioxide and water to sugars. During the growing season chlorophyll is continually being produced and broken down as part of its natural cycle. However as day length begins to shorten chlorophyll production starts to slow down and stop. Eventually all the chlorophyll is destroyed and the other colours, which have been present but unnoticed, show through. These pigments are usually a mixture of carotenoids and anthocyanins and give us the beautiful red and orange colours that look so magnificent in the Autumn sunshine. Cool temperatures can prolong this show while a frost can diminish it by killing the leaves and stopping the colour change.

The veins that carry fluids into and out of the leaf gradually close off as a layer of cells forms in the vein at the base of the leaf and block it, so preventing flow into and out of the leaf. When the block is complete the leaf falls off.

PRISONER OF ZENDA Watermill Theatre

In recent months I have written several reviews of productions at the Watermill Theatre, always with a final admonition – if you haven't savoured the delights of the place, then GO!

Last night we saw "The Prisoner of Zenda" - and never could my earlier advice have been better taken. The story, as many will know from the four film versions shot between 1913 and 1987, centres on the extraordinary likeness between the future Ruritanian King and his cousin Rassendyll. Rassendyll is visiting Ruritania purely by co-incidence and is discovered in a wooded glade by the King's aide, Fritz van Tarlenheim. The future King, known throughout the Kingdom for his alcoholic intake, meets our hero and promptly drinks himself into a stupor, though this with the help of some drugged concoction from his brother, the dastardly 'Black' Michael; inevitably this means the Prince cannot attend his own coronation and Rassendyll is called upon to stand in at the ceremony to save the Kingdom - and Princess Flavia, the Princes' girlfriend - from Black Michael's treachery.

There are only five players – including David Peacock, who starred so successfully in a riot of a play (reviewed earlier this year) called "Up 'n Under". The limitations on numbers means that each member wore (quite literally) several different guises and each contributed to a running dialogue which - though a little confusing until you got the hang of it - told the story from beginning to end. Along the way, several of the characterisations were truly wonderful - the simpering Cardinal, the alluring "women" - the sight of large Army Captains putting on skirts and shawls and transforming themselves into fawning women was hilarious; Black Michael's sinister scenes, and in particular Fritz, who surely must have spent time in the Army, so perfect a Company Sergeant Major would he make. Couple this with the most astonishingly clever scene shifting on what is a tiny, in-the-round stage and - my personal favourite - the sword duels and their inevitable blood letting, and you have nearly two hours of honestly superb entertainment for the price of a couple of drinks.

One small criticism – on occasion the music was too loud and certainly all four members of our party had difficulty hearing Princess Flavia give an impassioned update at one point.

There were perhaps 50 people in the audience – on previous visits we have gone on a Thursday night which for reasons which escape me seem almost always to have full houses – perhaps Wednesdays are too "mid-week?" As an actor it must be somewhat disappointing to play to such a small audience, though no doubt many nights will be to sell-out crowds, but if you haven't booked yet and really do want to see a treat, the play ends on November 11th – Box Office number is 01635 46044. As I said at the beginning – **GO**! – you will not be disappointed. Steve Price
