### PUBLIC TRANSPORT SERVICES

A couple of months ago I wrote about the, generally, very poor bus services out of the village to and from Newbury and Didcot, and I've been pursuing the subject with West Berkshire Council ever since, bearing in mind that they give financial support to a number of Rural services – which money originated, of course, from Council Tax and Income Tax payers ie you and me.

At the moment, it's a Good News and Bad News scenario. The Good News is that there is now an improved service from the Village to and from Reading which runs on Monday, Tuesday and Friday. It leaves at 09.15 and is due to arrive at Reading (St Mary's Butts in the Centre, virtually adjoining the Broad Street Mall and only a few minutes from the Oracle Centre and main shopping streets at 10.25. The Return journey leaves at 13.30 getting back here at 14.40, giving a good 3 hours in Reading. The single fare is £3.00, the return £5.00, but pro tems there is a special Day Return at £3.50 – which is less than the cost of parking in Reading for that length of time!

The Bad news is that WBC have let Stagecoach get away with changing their 234 Service (originally from Newbury to Didcot) so that this now (with the one exception mentioned below) bypasses Didcot and runs from Chilton via Harwell, Rowcross, Steventon and Drayton to Abingdon and Oxford. This means that not only is West Ilsley's prospect of a service to and from Didcot now a non-runner, but also that Hermitage, Hampstead Norreys, Compton and East Ilsley have been deprived of a service they had. This was done by WBC with no reference whatever to at least one of the villages concerned (East Ilsley). Two inexplicable aspects of this are: 1) why WBC want to subsidise a service that does little for Berkshire Villages and quite a lot of Oxfordshire locations already well served by Public Transport and 2) why, when there are something like 150 services per day between Didcot, Abingdon and Oxford, Stagecoach want to add a further 4.

The exception to 234's altered route is that the first Northbound bus of the day (Mon-Fir only) starts from Hampstead Norreys at 06.44, comes through West Ilsley at 07.00 and goes on to Didcot Station, arriving at 07.23. There is a journey back from Didcot Station at 18.15 arriving in the village at 18.38. Try to use it occasionally if times fit in with your rail journey – if only to thwart any intention the operator may have to withdraw the service "because no-one uses it".

I'll keep you posted from time to time as to West Berkshire's progress towards meeting Mr Prescott's pledge in "Our Countryside: the future" "We aim to have an hourly or more frequent bus service within a ten minute walk of a third more rural homes".

### ROSE RAGE

### WATERMILL THEATRE

If, like me, your early experiences of Shakespeare left you with a distinct lack of appreciation of the man and his plays, then "Rose Rage" will probably mark your conversion, such is the power of the performances currently showing at the Watermill Theatre (run ends 17<sup>th</sup> March so you still have time!)

Set in the bloody era of the Wars of the Roses, this is a two-part adaptation of Shakespeare's Henry VI trilogy – we chose to see the two parts a week apart. For those unfamiliar with the history, Henry V has bequeathed his throne to his rather more politically-correct, kindly and less violent son, in his youth being protected and guided by his appointed mentor and Lord Protector, the Duke of Gloucester; France is lost and the English Dukes, particularly those of York and Somerset, engage in bitter rivalry for opposing sides, the Red and White Roses of history.

The play is set largely in an abattoir, which proves surprisingly effective, though those of a nervous persuasion should perhaps be warned that the play accurately reflects the butchery and violence of the times. Henry marries the scheming and ambitious Margaret of Anjou (played by Robert Hands – this is an all-male cast) and gradually the characters descend into a maelstrom of political rivalry, double dealing, treachery and revenge for past and present wrongs.

Richard, Duke of York, for the toffs, and his agent Jack Cade, acting for the common people, scheme and plot to relieve Henry of his crown and ultimately the Lord Protector is murdered with the assistance of the Duke of Suffolk. Suffolk is banished to France and later murdered himself; Margaret, her French feathers suitably ruffled, bestrides the stage like the massive political and military presence her husband can never aspire to be and gradually the intensity of the rivalry reaches fever pitch. The eventual result is the death of Henry VI and the ascension by Edward, elder son of the late Duke of York, to the throne as Edward IV, with the future Richard III already scheming in the wings!

The cast are – one and all – brilliant; the second “half” in particular marked my conversion from relative philistine (I’d previously *enjoyed* Comedy of Errors and Twelfth Night, for instance) to out-and-out *fan* (or should that be “phan?”) of Shakespeare. If you can – go and see it; make no excuses but **GO** – the Watermill provides one of the very best evenings out and the talent on display deserves all the support it can get if it is to prosper.

Oh – and a final word – I read in the Sunday Times that the Arts Council refused a touring grant for the play. What a wasted opportunity that is, and what a very sad reflection on the Arts Council themselves. It seems the “Art” of unmade beds may be our lot from now on!
