SAD NEWS

We lost a current and a past villager on the same day last week. Jim Gore from Manor Farm was known to all. Pru Green-Wilkinson, who, with here husband John had for several years lived in The Maltings, but had lately moved to Winchester, will be known to those who have been around here for a few years – Pru and John continued their interest in West IIsley by receiving the WIN by mail, and regularly attended the village fete even after they had moved. We send our condolences to both families.

JIM GORE Richard and David Gore

Jim Gore came to Manor Farm in 1947 at the age of 22 starting the association with the Loyd family, Lockinge Estate and West Ilsley that lasted for the next 59 years. Times must have been hard during the war because when he arrived the lounge was being used as a chicken coop. The farm then had 14 employees including a pensioner who worked a horse and cart picking stones. The highest wage in his first week was £5 17s 1d and the total cost for all of them was £50 4s 10d. West Ilsley was also a bit different as there were only three other cars in the village and any travel was very difficult. The grain drier at Manor Farm was at Hodcott where the buildings were shared between the farm and the racing stables. The trainer was Jack Colling and a much more modest enterprise than now. All the grain was then stored in sacks which were all moved by hand. In 1963 Hodcott was

bought by Jakie Astor and the drier relocated to the village.

Jim was very active outside of the farm serving on numerous committees of agricultural societies and becoming especially involved with the National Farmers Union. For many years he was an assessor for the insurance branch of the NFU travelling widely mainly assessing fire damage.

It is more than 20 years since Jim was first diagnosed with Parkinson's disease starting a long battle for his health. Since then he has shown enormous strength and resolve, refusing to be defeated or succumb to his problems. With Shirley's tireless work in looking after him and refusal to concede that it would change their lives they have continued on as normal against enormous odds. Throughout it all he was never heard to complain.

The family would like to thank everybody for their kind thoughts.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Prevent crime with consideration for you neighbours.



Everyone wants to protect their home from the threat of burglary as best they can. To this end people install many burglar alarms, CCTV and security lighting. However, when using this equipment it pays to be

considerate of your neighbours.

For example, when installing security lighting, consider how bright the light is and where it is shining. Will it be shining in your neighbours home and keeping them awake? Security lights which use infra red sensors and come on only when movement is detected are recommended (providing this does not constantly switch on and off due to wildlife or pets passing). If you already have an existing outside light you can buy sensors separately to convert them into a security light.

If you live in a terraced house, you may be able to discuss security lighting with your neighbours and share the costs and the benefits.

Burglar alarms can also cause a nuisance for your neighbours, Make sure you use your alarm responsibly and try to ensure that it does not go off unnecessarily. A common complaint from neighbours about noise nuisance is burglar alarms sounding at night. Furthermore if your alarm goes off all the time then people will take less notice of it if it goes off for real as they will think it is another false alarm. It may be an idea to ask your neighbour to be a key holder for your alarm, if you trust them. Otherwise do your best to make sure alarms only go off in a real emergency, and apologise to your neighbours if you do set it off in the middle of the night

With CCTV you should remember to respect your neighbours privacy. Make sure that cameras are not pointing on their property or into their home. If you have a motion detector camera, then check the range, to make sure it will not focus in on your neighbours home.

As with security lighting, CCTV is something that you and your neighbour can set up jointly, especially if you have a shared entrance

Avoid Car Crime

Car crime is a local issue being tackled by your local police and west Berkshire Council.

A lot of vehicle crime results from criminals seeing opportunities and taking them. You can easily outsmart the thief by following the simple advice below, which you should remember even when your car is parked outside your house on the road or driveway.

• Always lock all of your doors, close the windows and sunroof every time you leave your car unattended. – however briefly.

• Always remove your car stereo if you can – it's one of the most sought after items in your vehicle. All car equipment – whether you can remove it or not – should be permanently marked in a visible place, with the cars registration number.

• Don't leave any other items on display in your vehicle. There are a number of objects that are particularly desirable to the thief, including mobile phones, laptop computers, cash and credit/debit cards, vehicle registration documents and private mail – especially with your address on it. However even an old coat on the back seat is a temptation for someone to 'smash and grab' they steal first and think about value later.

• Activate any security device on your car before leaving it unattended.

• Try to park your car in a safe location, a garage is best, if not, on your drive or a well lit location. If your car is ' hidden away' in a quiet location a thief will feel safer when trying to break into it.

• If you have a garage use it and make sure you lock the garage and the car in the garage.

• Keep you car keys safe, when you leave your vehicle always remove the key from the ignition and lock the doors. At home always keep your keys in a safe place which is out of sight of windows, doors, letterboxes, and cat - flaps.

• Be vigilant and report suspicious activity to the police.

• If you have any information relating to vehicle crime contact the police on 08458 505 505, or call CrimeStoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

• Do not buy stolen goods, the next victim could be you.

BROADBAND IN WEST ILSLEY

I am interested in finding out what speed other broadband users are getting on the connection to the East Ilsley exchange. I originally signed up to

a 2Mb line when the exchange was first enabled, but had some problems with the connection crashing which BT blamed on the quality of my line. The 'solution' was to downgrade my connection speed to 1Mb and to be fair it has been virtually problem free since then. However from conversations with some neighbours I have heard mention of speeds as low as 512K up to the aforementioned 2Mb and BT's own website suggests that the exchange could deliver up to 3Mbs.

With apologies to any BT employees reading this, I am afraid that many years of dealing with them have made me extremely cynical in respect of anything they tell me they can and can't do and the reasons why they can and can't do it.

On the basis that I am paying for up to 8Mb and the exchange can do 3Mb I would like to satisfy myself that 1Mb is as fast as it will go; as indeed might those who may have also been fobbed off with 1Mb or less.

If you have broadband and would like to participate little please survey in my qo to: www.adslguide.org.uk/tools/speedtest.asp where you can do a speed test of your line. Copy the result and paste into an email to me at broadband.20.rattlebox@spamgourmet.com it would probably be useful, but not essential, if you could let me know who your broadband supplier is in order that we can identify a good one which is familiar with our exchange.
