## West Ilsley Survey Results - August 2021 <br> Andrea Cook

## 1 Background

## Who was asked to participate in the survey?

Villagers were invited to give their views by completing the online questionnaire which was accessed by a link in the August WIN. Several reminders were sent during the following fortnight during which it was open. Paper copies of the questionnaire were delivered to those households in the centre of the village which were not on the email list.

There are residents on the electoral roll who live at Hodcott and who aren't on the email list, so unless special arrangements were made at the stables to enable these households to give input, they were not included. I am not aware of any responses from Hodcott residents.

## Response

73 households out of 127 in the main area of the village (excluding Hodcott) responded, so we had a response rate of $57 \%$. This also means that 54 households didn't give their views ( $43 \%$ ). Should we regard the views of the $57 \%$ as representing the whole village? Statisticians may caution against this as the population is so small, however, as long as it is clearly understood when using the results as evidence on which to base decision making, they must still give some indication of the feelings of some of our residents.

Of course, the answer to any question usually raises yet more questions - here's one ...
Given that participation was easy and quick (even for those without internet access) "only" 73 households responded. Should the Parish Council treat these as the "core" group who want to be actively involved with the village, and assume that the other 54 aren't interested and don't want to join in?

Readers can probably form their own view by looking around them when attending events and gatherings - I would suggest that from my own pre-covid observations that this is probably a reasonable hypothesis.

## Errors and omissions

Due to an oversight the Netball club was not included, and instead the Cricket club had three questions - one for the Cricket club overall (which should have read Netball) and separate questions for Cricket social and playing.

## Highest priority for the PC?

There were additional topics raised in the last question which was: In the opinion of your household, what do you think is the most important thing for the Parish Council to prioritise and why?

Due to the practicalities of using a free survey to gather results, the comments are shown as prints of the results screen on the survey, the size of the prints has had to be increased so that they can be read more easily, so they do take up rather a lot of space. A full printout of all of the answers is available at the end of this report. As you will see, the answers weren't all in the simple format of "what and why" as requested, so I have analysed and summarised them further to give the number and flavour of the comments for each result in section 2.

## 2 Summary of the results

It seems a reasonable assessment to say that the 73 households which responded to the survey are very enthusiastic and positive about what the village has to offer.

The numbers for each answer are shown in the table in section 3 and section 4 contains the screen prints of the comments made in answer to question 5

There is a lot of information contained in the answers and everyone will make their own interpretation. As I have been immersed in this process I thought it might be helpful to pull out some facts and figures as a summary - I will be very interested to discuss any alternative interpretations of the data - it's all here for you to use.

## Village facilities, Q2 of the questionnaire

The information is presented in descending order of "highly" valued by the 73 households (57\%) which responded to the survey.

1 The Pub is highly valued by $78 \%$ of respondents and has a total positive score (highly plus nice to have ratings) of $96 \%$. There were 12 comments which mentioned the pub - several comments that the pub should be the hub of the village and the central meeting place all year round.

2 Church and churchyard was the next most highly valued - 67\% highly, and the total positive score of $92 \%$. There were two comments re church and churchyard, one was a request for a gravel path up to the graveyard, the other asked that it should be prioritised as it is a meeting place for important support groups for our community.

3 Cricket club - playing was highly valued by $63 \%$ of respondents with a total of $93 \%$ positive score. There were no extra comments with regard to prioritising the cricket club by the PC.

4 Fete and Cricket club - social were both highly valued by $55 \%$ of respondents. The Fete scored $99 \%$ positively with only one responding household suggesting it is of little value, the Cricket club social, scored $97 \%$ positively with only two respondents suggesting little or no value. There were no suggestions that the Fete or the Cricket club - social were a priority for the PC.
$548 \%$ of respondents valued the tennis court highly, and the overall score was $95 \%$ positive. There were no additional comments about the court.

6 Village hall scored $42 \%$ for highly valued and an overall positive score of $89 \%$. There was one comment which asked that it should be prioritised as it is a meeting place for important support groups for our community. There were other comments which suggested that there should be a review of the village hall but these have been included within the notes on PC priorities below.

7 Fireworks were highly valued by $41 \%$ of households with an overall positive of $94 \%$. No other comments.

## Groups Q3

Under 5 s and Evergreens were highly valued by $40 \%$ of respondents, with overall positive responses for Under 5 s of $78 \%$ and Evergreens of $82 \%$. Table tennis is valued highly by only $8 \%$ of households but still scored $71 \%$ positive as $63 \%$ regard it as "nice to have". There were no additional comments about these groups.

## Amenities Q4

Footpaths/tracks and bridleways are regarded highly by $99 \%$ of respondents and $100 \%$ value them. Two comments suggested footpaths/tracks and bridleways should be a PC priority with regard to
clearing them, and there was also a mention that overhanging vegetation is a safety issue as it forces pedestrians to walk in the road.

Safety and security in the village, and the recreation ground are both highly valued by $90 \%$ of respondents. $99 \%$ of respondents rate the recreation ground positively and $97 \%$ safety and security Both amenities received 2 comments each but were not specific as to why/how they felt they is should be a PC priority

Roads, speed and safety were highly valued by $88 \%$ of respondents. There were 20 comments about this, covering speed and volume of traffic, traffic calming measures and increased traffic caused by A34 problems.

The defibrillator and usage training are highly valued by $81 \%$. There were no additional comments.
Rubbish/dog bins are valued highly by $77 \%$ of respondents and $95 \%$ rated them highly/nice to have. There were 2 comments prioritising this.

The play area and pond are both highly valued by $59 \%$ of respondents and, when "nice to have" was added they scored $89 \%$ and $96 \%$. The play area attracted 2 comments - no specific reasons apart from its important to those households and the pond 1 - mentioned cleaning and tidying of the surrounding area as a priority

Gritting bins are highly valued by $50 \%$ of respondents, $32 \%$ said they are nice to have, so still $82 \%$ positive. There were no additional comments.

The gazebo is highly valued by only $26 \%$ of respondents, but another $56 \%$ rate it as "nice to have" so a total of $82 \%$ positive. No further comments re the gazebo.

The noticeboards outside the hall and the church are highly valued by only $25 \%$ and $22 \%$ and scored only $67 \%$ and $64 \%$ positive with respondents. There were no comments about the noticeboards.

## Additional topics raised as PC priorities in Q5:

Flooding (6) - flood prevention
PC (12) - comments included getting engagement from the whole of the village, community spirit and a collaborative approach, governance and representation of the PC membership and its representation of the broader village. The minutes of the PC meetings and their value as a historical record of the meetings and issues discussed. Questions about spending village funds on village hall refurbishment without undertaking a review of which building should house the village meeting place (suggestions of a review). Community cohesion and representation. Encourage participation at every level from all interest groups. Communication. Spending the budget fairly. Keeping the peace.

General upkeep (4) of village assets
Netball (2) - already acknowledged, it was an error that this wasn't included in the questionnaire
Dog fouling (2) - address the problem on the cricket pitch and also from a safety issue
Other single issues raised as PC priorities were: war memorial repair, review of a shop, holding events, fibre broadband and parking at the pub and rec
