West IIsley Cricket Club has had a successful season in 2009 and is looking forward to this year. The ground has been voted as one of the best in the Oxfordshire Cricket Association League (OCA), the club is renowned for its friendly atmosphere and sportsmanship. The youth section is extremely successful and we have a number of qualified coaches.

However, the club is in desperate need for more umpires. For each team in the OCA we need to supply an umpire for each Saturday to officiate in a neutral match. If we cannot supply an actual umpire then we usually supply one of our players which in turn weakens our team selection. If we do not supply an umpire then we get fined both money and points.

We are very lucky that we have three Umpires on our books but two of them are limited in the number of games they can officiate for us.

Although it is normally thought that umpires are ex players that is really only true for one of ours. One of ours started umpiring because his children started playing for the club and the other because he just loved the game and in fact has never played it.

So ex-players, parents or spectators, male or female why not think about it, PLEASE.

Talk to us, give it a go. It is very rewarding, training will be given, match and training expenses are paid.

You can umpire on a casual basis or get really involved and go on to officiate in higher level matches. Don't be put off thinking about it if you have not been involved in the game, there is a lot of support, it is great fun, I know.

TENNIS COURT UPDATE: TEMPORARY COURT CLOSURE

We held our tennis committee's first AGM earlier in January, the main talking point being how to raise funds for the much needed replacement of the fence surrounding the court and also to resurface the deteriorating court surface. With that in mind, members of the committee, various members of their families and also David Carlisle and Clive Hooker assembled at the court last Sunday morning to clear the court and surrounding area of a build up of winter debris so that we could assess the court's safety. Unfortunately, it was the committee's view that we will have to temporarily close the court due to an accelerated build up of moss on the court surface which is making the court unplayable and dangerous under foot. In addition, sections of the fence have become dangerous and need urgent

attention. However, we hope that it will be only a matter of weeks before the the moss is treated, the fence patched and the court safe to play on again. We will e-mail all members and update WIN once we are open again.

Looking forward, we have also agreed to begin a monthly **maintenance programme** with a view to keeping the court and fence safe and open throughout the coming season while we raise funds for their replacement. Committee members will be meeting again at 3pm on Saturday, 30th January to continue our work on clearing the bank surrounding the court of brambles, branches and rubbish. Anyone wishing to join us would be extremely welcome!

In terms of **fund raising** our bijou committee (yes - there's just the four of us folks) face an uphill task. We will need to carry out a sustained period of fund raising to raise the significant sums of money required to replace the fence (our first priority @£7,000) and to resurface (@£10,000). We will of course be applying for grants but most relevant schemes require matched funding. We've had some good ideas including a discounted membership scheme, tournaments, dinners and evening events but would welcome any suggestions (or help). Both the fence and the surface are deteriorating rapidly despite our best efforts. The fence needs to be replaced this year and the surface, ideally resurfaced over Winter 2010/11. It would be such a shame to be closing the court on a permanent basis this time next year for want of a little application on our part, particularly when the court has been played on so much and by so many this past year. We are confident we can do it but would warmly welcome the village's support.

If anyone feels able to help us with fund raising or maintenance or feels able to spare some time to join our committee please do contact any one of the committee members (myself, Polly Muir, Amanda Hagen or our newest recruit, fresh from press-ganging, Liz Dray (thanks Liz!)). Lastly, many thanks to David Gardhouse who has only recently stepped down from the committee but whose excellent care of the court has allowed us to continue playing safely for so long throughout the past year. THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION (RBL) -COMPTON, ISLEYS & NORREYS BRANCH

Planned visit to the National Memorial Arboretum Sunday 18th April 2010

The Officers and members of the local branch of the Royal British Legion (RBL) – Compton, Isleys and Norreys – thank everyone who organised and donated to last year's Poppy Appeal. The result was a record collection from our downland area of nearly £2,500 – thank you all very much. This generosity together with the large turnout at the branch's Remembrance Sunday parade and service, held last year at Aldworth, is testimony to the presently high profile that the welfare of exservicemen and women has at the present time.

The RBL's mission is to support ex servicemen and their families. In Berkshire last financial year, the RBL distributed such support to the value of more than one million pounds. Beneficiaries, previously predominantly veterans of the two world wars, now typically are those younger ex servicemen who have served in conflicts such as Aden, Borneo, the Falklands, the Balkans, Iraq and Afghanistan. Casualty figures being incurred in this latter campaign are, of course, getting wide publicity.

As one of its activities during 2010, the branch is planning a day coach trip to the National Memorial Arboretum (NMA) near Burton on Trent in Staffordshire on Sunday 18th April and would like all who read this notice to consider joining us?

The NMA, founded in 2003, is the UK's memorial to all those who have given their lives in the service of their country since the second world war – more than 16,000 of them – their names engraved on massive Portland stone walls. The arboretum has been set within a rich tapestry of lakes, ponds, river habitats, grassland, reed beds and wetlands on a 150 acre site. It is in the heart of the National Forest and fast maturing with recent hedge laying and building of an otter holt. Mid April should be a wonderful time to visit this beautiful place.

The cost of this day trip, depending on final numbers, will be in the region of £15 per person to cover coach travel from our villages and return. Entrance to the NMA, managed by the RBL, is free. Travellers can take a picnic lunch with them or make use of the on site canteen. You do not have to be a member of the RBL to attend – all are welcome.
