# **Parish** the Parish Council held by the Highways **Update**

Ron Cook and Alan Bloor attended a meeting on behalf of Agency on the A34 essential road maintenance. As

many parishioners may not be aware this work is to commence on the 15 January 2007 and be completed by the end of March 2007. Information has been obtained from the Highways Agency with regard to the effects this maintenance will have on West IIsley and the surrounding villages, some of this information is contained in a document supplied by Peter Scott from the Agency.

A map is also included which shows the extent of the contra flow.

We have been having regular dialogue with the Agency to ensure they have made everyone aware, this includes, local schools, bus services and yes West Berkshire Highways. They have said they will provide regular updates that can be issued via the West IIsley News and they have provided contact details as follows:

In order to keep residents of West Ilsley informed regarding the forthcoming A34 Chilton major maintenance scheme, we've compiled below a Q&A list which we hope will answer any queries you may have.

#### What is being done?

The Highways Agency will be undertaking essential road maintenance works on the A34, between the West IIsley Interchange and the A417 overbridge near Harwell.

The scheme includes partial reconstruction to northbound and southbound carriageways and the renewal of road markings and studs. Drainage works, parapet replacement, sign replacement and safety fence works will also be included.

The scheme will ensure the road is maintained in a good condition and will improve the surface condition of the carriageways, resulting in a smoother and quieter ride.

#### Why are these works taking place?

This stretch of the A34 is in need of essential maintenance works in order to continue to ensure it is kept serviceable and more importantly, safe for road users.

#### What traffic management will be used?

Whereas there are usually two lanes open both north and southbound on the A34, only one lane will be open in both directions during the scheme, when one of the carriageways is closed. method of traffic management is known as a contraflow system, and allows our workforce to undertake the required maintenance safely, whilst still allowing for traffic to move along the A34.

In order to enhance safety for drivers and workers in this environment, the speed limit along the works will be reduced to 40mph.

#### When is the scheme happening?

The contraflow system is being put into place on 15<sup>th</sup> January 2007. Work will be undertaken 24hours a day, seven days a week to ensure we complete the job as soon as possible.

The works are scheduled to be completed by mid March 2006. The estimated date is of course weather permitting.

#### What delays are expected?

There may be delays of approximately 20 minutes or longer both north and south bound.

#### Will traffic be diverted through the West IIsley village?

No. The diversion is in place for local residents only to access their village, and not for A34 traffic. We appreciate the concern that HGVs and normal traffic will try to use this road as a "rat-run" to get ahead of any traffic, and will be doing the following to help prevent this from occurring:

- 1) A sign will be put up at the northbound A34 East Ilsley exit slip with message stating that access is only for local traffic.
- 2) We will be talking to the Road Haulage Association and the Freight Transport Association to ask their members not to use this for their own safety (as could be argued the road is not suitable for large HGV traffic), as well as the safety of others.
- 3) We will be contacting the satellite navigation companies, to request they do divert traffic via the West IIsley village.

But, in addition the West IIsley entry slip road will not be open for the first four weeks of the scheme - which means that traffic will not be able to join the A34 northbound from this junction, and therefore during this period, the route cannot physically be used as a "Rat-Run".

#### Will I be affected by noise from the works?

We always strive to ensure that any works noise are kept to a minimum, and we have agreed all noise levels with your local authority. We will also be issuing local residents with a formal letter in advance of the works, which will have a dedicated telephone number that you can call in order to speak directly with our site office, if you are disturbed by noise during the evening. The duty agent will then see if anything can be done to alleviate any disturbance you may experiencing.

The carriageway maintenance itself will include noise-reducing surfacing, so the sound of vehicle tyres on the A34 will be reduced once the scheme is complete.


### How can I be kept up to date with the scheme's progress?

# TAKE CARE ON THE ROADS THIS WINTER

Winter is upon us again and West Berkshire Council is urging all motorists to take extra care when driving in adverse weather conditions. The Council's Highways & Transport Department have released their annual Winter Service advice leaflet entitled 'Safer Driving this Winter on West Berkshire Roads' with information on salted routes in the area and road safety advice.

Leaflets are available from the Council offices, local libraries or to download from the road safety pages of the Council's website <a href="https://www.westberks.gov.uk">www.westberks.gov.uk</a>

Essential Winter Driving Tips:

- Keep the following items in your vehicle
- Additional warm, high visibility clothing & waterproof footwear
- A torch, a shovel, a de-icer and a scraper
- Chocolate or energy bars, in case of emergency
- Plan your route carefully using the Council's Winter Service leaflet, which shows a map of routes that will be salted.
- Check the weather forecast before starting your journey and listen to local travel bulletins
- Take a fully charged mobile phone (for use in an emergency not to be used while driving)
- Ensure windows, wipers, lights and indicators are clean and in good working order
- Check tyre treads and pressures and keep your car battery charged
- In snow drive slowly and in as high a gear as possible.
- In icy conditions avoid harsh braking and steering. Increase your stopping distance by 10.
- In rain, fog and snow use dipped headlights for better visibility
- Beware of the road surface on bridges becoming icy before the approach roads to and from them, due to cold air or water underneath.
- Combat low Winter sun by using your sun visor. If you cannot see properly slow down!

### What kind of projects did the Big Buzz Challenge fund in 2005?

**Spurcroft Primary School** wanted to develop a vegetable garden and apple orchard alongside their local community. They were awarded £600 to start their project. All the children contributed ideas for the design with the support of their teacher.

**Roland and Ryan** are aged 13 and live in Aldermaston. They talked to other young people in their community and identified the need for a small skateboard ramp. They made a short video telling us their story and were awarded £1,300 towards the new ramp.

**Leckhamstead Lizards Youth Club** decided to enter the challenge because they needed some new equipment for the club. They acted out a small play to express their needs and they were awarded £300 to help them.

**Total Eclipse is a local drama group** who wanted some funds to help them work with a group of young carers. They were awarded £300 to help them in their project.

Young people in Great Shefford have led the way in identifying what young people in their village want. They know that there is a need for a drama group and new football goalposts – this is just the kind of project the Challenge would like to fund.

We want to hear from young people who have good ideas and who have support in realising their dreams.
