Drugs Act 2005

Drug dealers who target schools or get children to act as couriers will face stiffer jail sentences under a new law which has come into force. Police have also been given powers to request x rays from suspects they

believe may have swallowed cocaine or heroin to avoid detection. They could also spend more time in prison if it turns out that they did ingest drugs or tried to hide them in their body cavities. Under the drugs Act 2005, which came into effect on January 1st 2006 officers can hold suspected drug "mules" for 192 hours as opposed to 96 hours to allow extra time for drugs to pass through their systems.

The government says the tougher measures are part of a clampdown on those selling illegal drugs on the streets of Britain "The damage caused to individuals and families by drugs can be devastating" said Paul Goggins, the Home Office minister responsible for the drugs policy.

"Drug misuse can ruin lives and we are determined to tackle this by putting more drug dealers behind bars and getting more addicts into treatment. "The new measures will make sure the courts are taking into account the vulnerability of young people when punishing those who target our schools to sell drugs to children and crack down on those who swallow or hide drugs to escape justice."

The new legislation amends the 1971 Misuse of drugs Act to enable judges to view as aggravating factors the sale of drugs near schools during school hours or use of under 18s couriers. Police say that pushers often use young teenagers to carry drugs, and in some cases primary schoolchildren. In Gloucestershire, officers came across a case where a dealer sent his four year old daughter out of the house with a bag of heroin to drop for an addict. Detective Sergeant John Roberts, head of the Gloucestershire Policing Priority Unit tackling the drug problem, said the use of such a young child was rare but dealers routinely used 12 or 13 year olds, often their own children.

It was also becoming more common for dealers to carry small wraps of heroin between their buttocks, known as "plugging" or in their mouths, so they could swallow them if stopped by police. Police now have the authority to request that the suspect has an x-ray or ultrasound scan, and the courts will be able to draw their own conclusion if a defendant refuses.

Apologies

P Knight, D. Hagen and R. Cook. Due to the number of apologies, the Chair decided to postpone 3 items of the agenda (items 7,8 and 10) until another meeting could be organised (next Monday)

2. <u>Matters arising</u>

It was noted that tree surgery has taken place along the pathway of West Ilsley House.

3. Correspondence received

Letter received back from Neil Stacey at WBC re our questions concerning the new 7.5 tonne weight restriction sign off the A34 by the turnoff to Beedon. The Parish Council had suggested that one close to the West Ilsley turn off might also prevent lorries short cutting through the village. However, WBC said that this would not be appropriate as there is no single parallel route. The Clerk to challenge this with another letter.

Letter received back from WBC re the loose Granite setts on Bury Lane. This has been addressed and work taken place.

Letter received back re traffic management from WBC. In an attempt to reduce speeding through the village, they have agreed to extend the 30mph sign back towards Farnborough, but not at the Eastern end. The Clerk to challenge this decision and also the reference to excessive speeds being observed in the village. If this is the case then we request some action via the police.

Letter received from The Rotary Club who informs us that our 2 local schools have agreed to sign up to the Life Education Centre

Programme. Funding support to be discussed at the next meeting.

The group continues to cost out various levels of play equipment and start to consider its feasibility re funding/maintenance/position etc.
