CHILDREN OF WEST ILSLEY WIN THE

LOTTERY! Parish Council gets £20,000 for play area.

I'm delighted to announce that the Parish Council has won a grant of more than £20,000 to help us create a play area at the top of the Recreation Ground. The grant's been awarded by the Big Lottery Fund, which ploughs National Lottery money into community projects, and if all goes according to plan, the play area will be up and running by late summer. Good, safe equipment that blends in with its surroundings is amazingly expensive, so even a very large grant will only buy a very small playground. But all the indications are that it will be a popular addition to the village for children and parents alike. We'd now welcome their ideas about what to put in the play area before we make our choice in the next few weeks. The grant is the culmination of 18 months' work by the Parish Council, backed by the Lockinge estate and the Carlisle family, who helped to identify a site adjacent to the tennis court. We sent out a questionnaire to test the level of support for the idea and received 23 responses on behalf of 45 children. All the responses except one were strongly in favour. Parents emphasised the lack of facilities for children in the village since the Harrow's swings were taken down and some said they were driving their kids to the park in Wantage to play. The Parish Council unanimously approved the proposal for a play area to the right of the tennis court as you look up the Recreation Ground from the Harrow. We then applied for the grant while mothers in the village set about fund-raising. One-third of the £520 raised by the nativity was earmarked for the play area. The winter warmer at the end of January raised a further £870 and more than 80 people showed their support on a magnificent evening. The Big Lottery Fund's £20,957 gives us a total budget of £22,000 so far and there may be more to come from a separate application to the Local Network Fund for £2,000 to buy toddler swings. A lot of people have helped us get this far and I'd particularly like to thank David Hogg, head of children's commissioning quality at West Berkshire and Council. who checked our grant application and included it in a batch that was submitted to the Big Lottery Fund from this area. At the risk of doing a Gwyneth Paltrow at the Oscars I'd also like to thank Dries for his guidance with the application, Alison Banks for clearing the way to all this with the Lockinge estate, Sandra for helping to choose the site, Angela for the nativity, the Amandas, Alison Ryan, Mandy and Donna for the winter warmer and everyone who's backed us along the

A Fresh Start - New Service Pattern:

As you can see from the above schedule there is a new service pattern in West Ilsley and in the West Ilsley, Peasemore, Beedon and Farnborough Benefice as a whole.

West Ilsley will continue to have 3 regular services a month but with a slightly revised format. There will be a modern communion service with a Sunday Club for children in place of the All Age Service. The new service starts at 10am when everyone comes to church. During the first hymn, children who wish to can go out with the Sunday club leaders and a parent, if the child wishes, to the Village Hall, for activities, returning in time to rejoin their family to receive communion or a blessing at the altar rail. There will also be a 6pm "Songs of Praise" non-communion service where the focus will be on popular, rousing hymns and praver!

We do hope this format will be a success but it will be reviewed again in September to see how it is working.

Mothering Sunday: there is an All Age Communion service at Beedon at 10am at which families are encouraged to go and who will be warmly welcomed.

The **Plant and Cake Sale** will take place this year on 12 May.

The church will also be organising a **Flower Festival** over the weekend of 30 June/1July. There will be some beautiful flower arrangements in the church over the weekend. The Sandham Singers will be giving a light-hearted concert in the early evening followed by a summer drinks party with nibbles. On Sunday the Bishop of Oxford will be taking the evening service. POLICE UPDATE

Operation Fascia targets anti-social behaviour in West Berkshire

Police in West Berkshire have been carrying out Operation Fascia, which is aimed at targeting anti-social behaviour in the area.



This follows on from the success of Operation Footprint that was carried out over the summer.

Using data from analysts, officers, Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) and Specials we have been targeting anti-social behaviour hotspots with the aim of preventing criminal damage.

Supt Chris Shead, West Berkshire LPA Commander, said: "Anti-social behaviour is a

significant concern to the communities that we serve and it is widely accepted that it often leads to criminal damage.

"Criminal damage has increased by over a third this year within West Berkshire and it is one of the key crime issues that we are targeting.

"The aim of the operation has been to have a highly visible presence in areas that have antisocial behaviour, to prevent acts of criminal damage being carried out.

"What may appear to be high jinks or 'fun' to those involved, often causes huge distress to victims. This is exacerbated when the same people are repeatedly targeted and we intend to deal with offenders robustly and quickly to ensure that we minimise the impact of their wrongdoing.

"Anyone found engaging in criminality or anti-social behaviour will be dealt with accordingly, either by arrest if appropriate or the issue of a fixed penalty notice. My officers will be relentless in their pursuit of those committing damage."

The other aspect of the operation is visiting victims that have been repeatedly targeted and giving them crime reduction advice.

Romy Freiburghaus, Crime Reduction Adviser for West Berkshire, gives the following tips:

- Make sure your home and the surroundings of your home are well lit and well maintained.
- Improve natural or other surveillance, cut hedges at front of the house down to one metre.
- If your property has been targeted, take a photo of the damage and try to repair the damage as soon as possible.
- If possible park your car in your garage
- If you do park on the street, don't leave any valuables in your car. Fold in wing mirrors. Retract aerials.
- Improve lighting if you park outside your home.
- Park your car in well lit areas, especially in town centres near pubs and night clubs
